TEMPERANCE ACT REGULATIONS - Additional regulations to the P.E.I. Temperance Act contained in the latest issue of the Royal Gazette. They prohibit the transportation of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes to or between points in the province, except to or from the Temperance Commission; also the exportation of intoxicating liquor to points outside the Province, other than by brewers or distillers duly licensed by the Dominion Government and by the Commission.

At the 11 o'clock service in St. Paul's Church yesterday, Rev. R. H. Waterman, B.A., D.D., officiated at a very impressive service, which began with the rite of Confirmation, followed by special prayers pertaining to the re-opening of the church and the dedication of the Shulmerich Chinese, and also of several other memorials gifts including a Prayer Book for the Rector's desk and two silk flags, donated anonymously to "the glory of God and the beautification of His church."

The death occurred at the Prince County Hospital on Thursday Sept. 21st, of Mrs. Edwin Taylor, Wilmet Valley after a brief illness of ten days with pneumonia. She was born in Summerside, her maiden name being Elizabeth Ferguson and was the daughter of the late Duncan Ferguson and his wife Charlotte Montgomery. After her marriage she lived in Calgary where her husband was employed with the Canadian Pacific Railway, later moving to Halifax and finally to the Taylor homestead in Wilmet Valley. She was a devoted member of the North Cove United Church, a very active member of the Women's Missionary Society and only about a month previous to her death entertained the society at her home.
