Scientists Build New Dodo Likeness

By ARTHUR EDSON WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (AP)—A newly constructed dodo roosts in the Smithsonian Institution today.

And Smithsonian scientists, every bit as proud as mama dodo must have been when she laid the egg more than two centuries ago, reckon it's the most complete dodo specimen in North America.

It's half real dodo (bones, that is) and half imagination helped along by careful research into descriptions written by early explorers.

Dr. H. Friedmann, of the Institution's bird division, said today he doesn't know why man has been so much heed to the luckless dodo.

Why in North America alone more than 100 birds have become extinct in modern times. Yet does anyone say "as dead as a passenger pigeon?"

No, says Dr. Friedmann, it's as "dead as a dodo."

The dodos lived on Mauritius and neighboring islands in the Indian Ocean, and first were described by Admiral Jacob Van Neck in 1598.

Dr. Friedmann thinks the dodo might have retained its health if it hadn't been for the pigs and the monkeys brought in by the early settlers.

The pigs rooted out and ate the dodo's eggs. When the pigs missed some until they hatched—and gobbled the young.

There hasn't been a live one for more than 200 years.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (CP)—For most of the last 10 days the United States Senate has been scene of a filibuster against a more sweeping legislative measure to set up a permanent fair employment practices which, for one thing, would help Negroes to get an even break with whites in the employment market.

The President wants the legislation and no doubt it would gain the approval of the majority in Congress. But southern Democrats want it and are determined it will never pass. Hence the filibuster against even consideration of the measure. They are now trying to talk indefinitely.

Webster's International Dictionary describes a filibuster as "one who plunders" but also giving the proper legislative meaning as "speaking merely to consume time" in opposition to action proposed by a majority.

This reporter dropped into the Senate to see the filibuster in action about the middle of a recent afternoon.

The Senate floor, where normally 96 lawmakers, each elected for six-year terms perform their task as the superior legislative body of the United States, was a yawning of vacant seats—almost.

"For practically 90 per cent of the tax-paying public new (income tax) forms dispense with substantially all calculations, but the tax is not income with a standard percentage of the income above the minimum of the range to be added to the dollar statement contained in the table."

ANNUAL MEETING OF HORTICULTURALISTS The importance of developments in the international trade field and their bearing upon the future of producers of Canadian fruits and vegetables will be stressed in the program for the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Canadian Horticultural Council, to be held in Ottawa, February 4, to 6 inclusive.

In addition to the resolutions referred to the Council by the Provincial and Dominion member associations, problems concerning price ceilings, subsidies, income tax and floor prices will be reviewed. Following the meeting, a committee of the Council is to meet in Ottawa with a committee from the United States Horticultural Council. President J. Wilfred Boulier, Charlottetown, P. E. I., will preside and Council members and delegates from every Province will attend.

There are 102 establishments in Canada manufacturing concentrated milk products. Of these 82 are licensed to produce products for human consumption and 20 for animal consumption only, or cessid. These plants are located in every province with the most in Ontario and Quebec.

Increasing mechanism of agriculture is creating an extensive field for the investigation, testing, and demonstration of farm implements and machines. Engineering, farm building, construction research, adaptation of existing equipment to special uses, labour-saving devices, and a wide range of maintenance and repair problems are subjects of Experimental Farm investigation and research. At Central Farm, Ottawa, and at the Swift Current Experimental Station, Sask., engineering staffs and facilities are being assembled for increased work in agricultural engineering. The Engineering Section there have been doing outstanding work.
