COAL PRICES RISE.

NEW YORK, May 24—That the public will have to pay the increase of ten per cent in the wages of the anthracite mine workers granted by operators was demonstrated yesterday when it was announced that the price of hard coal would be advanced twenty-five cents on June 1, there by increasing the maximum price of coal at tide water from \$5 to \$5.25 a ton.
The coal companies estimate that a price advance of about twenty cents a ton on domestic sizes will be required to cover the wage increase while the balance of the price advantage of twenty-five cents will go towards making up the increase in the cost of production, aside from the cost of labor, that has taken place, is due to the greater cost of materials and to the greater outlay for pumping, ventilation and underground transportation.
Another factor which the operator asserts is largely responsible for the advance in the employment of more hoisting engineers at the collieries, compelled by recent State legislation, which limits the working time of the engineers to eight hours a day. The operators are now compelled to employ three engineers where only two were formerly employed.
While the maximum price at tide water for coal was \$5 a ton heretofore, the operators always allowed what is called summer discount of twenty per cent, beginning April 1 the prices on the latter date remain in force until the following April and continuing until September 1. This discount was based on the maximum of \$5, but hereafter it will be based upon the maximum of \$5.25. Hence, on June 1, the price, minus the discount, will be \$4.95; July 1, \$5.05; August 1, \$5.15; September 1, \$5.25. Notice to the trade of the advance will be issued within a few days.

CANADA BARRED.

OTTAWA, May 26—Canada has been barred from making an exhibit at the Wisconsin State Exhibition this year. The State Immigration authorities have protested against Canada being allowed to make a showing. They declare that Canadian immigration literature is false and discovered by people who have been induced to go from Wisconsin to Canada and have returned poorer and wiser.
The immigration authorities at Ottawa state there is no foundation for the charge against their literature but saying that the State of Wisconsin objects to losing good citizens at the rate they have been moving to Canada for the past five years.

A LADIES EXTRA.

ITHACA, N. Y., May 26—Sixteen pages of brightly written local news carefully edited telegraph "copy" and slangy sporting matter, gathered and "made up" by members of the Women's Federation, formed the afternoon edition of one of Ithaca's papers today.
Prominent women of the city and university were in charge of the supplement extra, and they kept their sisters members of the federation busy covering assignments over at Police Headquarters, the city offices and up at the university.
When the presses had reeled off the edition the fair editors, reporters and copy readers took them out into the streets and sold them.

ARMEN STRIKE

BERLIN, May 25—The German professional armmen have unanimously decided to strike tomorrow if the demand of the German aviator union for a minimum wage of \$77 monthly which was presented today to the Aeroplane Construction Companies, is not granted before noon. Tomorrow is the principal day of the big National aviation meet, and the strike of the armmen will vease its failure.
It is stated that the wage of some of the professional aviators are as low as \$37.50 a month.

A NOBLE ACT.

MONTREAL, May 27—Discipline sheets relates to the men on a big railway like the C. P. R., reveal many a comedy and tragedy recorded in cold, unimaginative phrase, but it is a long time since such a remarkable little romance as that which Engineer R. Gariepy is connected, has found its way into the official records of the company.

On May 13, Engineer Gariepy, with his hand at the throttle of his giant locomotive, as it thundered on its way, saw a dog on the track. Some engineers would have run over the animal without the slightest qualm. But the human heart of Gariepy revolted at the idea. Perhaps, too, some strange intuition accompanied and accentuated his consideration for the animal. At any rate, he jumped on the brakes, and in an instant every wheel on the train was groaning as the train was brought sharply to a standstill.
The dog was saved in the very nick of time. But still it stood in the centre of the track. Was it dazed? Was it fascinated by the horror of the towering juggernaut that had so nearly smashed out its life.
Jumping out of his cab to drive the animal from the track, Gariepy found the ground behind it a little hid playing, unconscious of danger. Trying to save a dog, the engineer had saved a human life. And it was difficult to tell who was the more leashed—the man who had done this thing, or the dog who had stood by the child trying with its puny body to shield it from the great locomotive thundering so rapidly down upon it.
The bare facts were sent in in a formal way to headquarters. Who was the child thus saved? Exactly how far from Montreal—for it was in the Montreal division—did this little romance happen? The records do not say. But yesterday there was placed among the discipline records of the company the laconic locution:
"R. Gariepy, engineer. Credited with five marks. Cause: For forethought in stopping a train on seeing dog on track, discovering a small child on track behind the dog, May 3, 1912."

NEEDS NATIONAL CONGRESS
PARIS, May 25—The idea of assembling a congress of the European owners in an endeavor to settle the 'turko-Italian war seems to be gathering force. It is understood here that Turkey is favorable to such a suggestion, and The Temps thinks that while it is too early to form definite conclusions, Italy is not hostile to it, and this would mean a solution of the conflict. The newspaper understands that Italy is even ready to abandon her previous insistence on a decree proclaiming the annexation of Tripoli.
