Livestock

MONTREAL, May 21—(CP)—There were 70 cattle, 22 sheep and lambs, 431 hogs and 1,040 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. All classes of livestock were steady. The cattle offered were mostly cows. A few good cows made \$5.50 to \$6 with mediums from \$4.50 to \$5.25 and common butchers down to \$4. Canners and cutters were \$2.50 to \$3.50. Common bulls were \$4.25 to \$5.25. Veal calves ranged from \$5 to \$8. Good veals made \$7.50 to \$8, with medium good kinds around \$7. Fair to medium veals in mixed lots from \$6.25 to \$6.50. The bulk of the sales were made between \$5.75 and \$6.25. Drinkers were \$4.75 to \$5. Spring lambs were sold for \$5 to \$8 each, according to weight and quality. Sheep were \$4 to \$6. Hogs were steady at \$9.50 for bacon fed and watered, and up to \$8.65 off trucks. Sows drew \$1 per hog premium with the regular cuts on off grades. Sows were \$4.25 to \$4.75. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$11.30 hot weight.

NEW YORK, May 21—(AP)—Stocks crumbled to new lows for the past two years in today's market, with war issues principally depressed, as fears revived in Wall Street of a German-forced peace following fresh Allied reverses. Canadian issues fell back almost in a body. Distillers lost 1-8 points. Dime one cent, International Nickel 1 3-8, Walkers 3 and Quebec Power 3 1-4. Fractional losses were registered by Brazillian, Ford, Imperial Oil, Inva-Tobacco and Massey Harris. Hollinger gained 1-8 point. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks hit a new bottom since June 3, 1938, and was off 2.9 points at 37.7. Transfers of 3,939,510 shares were the largest since Sept. 12 last year. They compared with 1,237,780 the day before. The market was one of the broadest in months, 1,042 individual issues changing hands against 876 yesterday. Prominent losers included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, General Motors, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Allied Chemical, Westinghouse, American Smelting, Eastman Kodak, Loft, Texas Corp, Standard Oil of N. J., American Telephone, U. S. Rubber and Great Northern.

Graduates Advised Not To "Pussyfoot"

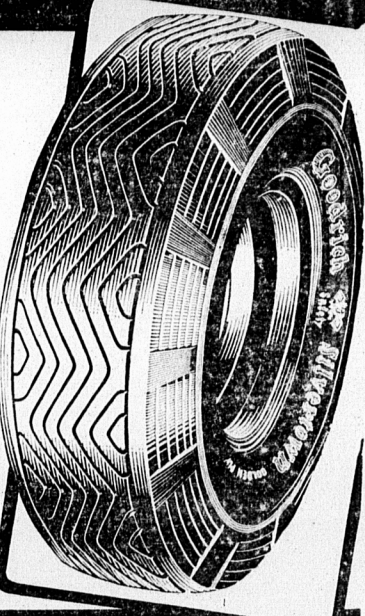

Dancers Ordered From Egypt

ALEXANDRIA, May 20—(CP)—Nearly 500 Hungarian and Spanish dancers were ordered today to leave Egypt for the Italian air route by the government and British authorities intensified their counter-propaganda drive. The government decided that dancers earned too much while entertaining Allied soldiers and sailors. Consequently cabarets were prohibited from renewing their contracts. With the tightening of the network for national security civilians were barred from zones 600 feet from Alexandria's fortified areas. Foreigners were required to register with the police within 48 hours after arrival in Egypt. Allied sources emphasized that the government made necessary maintenance of powerful forces in the near east. In addition to the formidable Allied war fleet in this vicinity, nearly 1,000,000 troops are estimated to be scattered in Egypt and the near east. The United States legation has advised Americans to leave this area as quickly as possible. SURVEY AIR ROUTE MONTREAL, May 21—(CP)—Surrendering possibilities of a Montreal to Nassau air route by way of Atlantic coastal cities, as representatives of Carolinas and Georgia cities arrived here late today after a flight from Charleston, S. C. The group, flown here in a Canadian Colonial Airways plane, discussed the project at a dinner meeting tonight and further conferences are scheduled for tomorrow before the return flight is made.

I. R. A. Claim Is Ignored

LONDON, May 20—(CP)—A broadside from an Irish Republican Army private station picked up in Belfast yesterday claimed that a British troopship, with 2,000 men aboard was sunk during the Norwegian campaign as a result of an explosion in the hold and engine room caused by the I. R. A. The I. R. A. announcer claimed the ship was sunk 30 miles off Narvik, North ern Norway. The British press gave scant attention to this attempt by the I. R.
