Ready For The Gun Glistening in new paint and varnish, Shamrock V, Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger, and Enterprise, Harold S. Vanderbilt's defender in the America's cup series opening off here Saturday returned to the water today. Both almost immediately spread sail and it was evident there would be no let down in activity during the 24 hours, or less, remaining before the starting signal is sounded nine miles to southeast of Brenton Reef Lighthouse.

Enterprise arrived here mooring in Brenton Cove under her own canvas from Bristol. The two boats, Britain's hope of regaining and Columbia's hope of retaining, yachting supremacy, bow saucily to each other as they rise and fall with the motion of the water tonight. Their moorings are close by, so close that each crew is aware of the other's activities.

Spectators for the international yachting classic had begun to pour into Newport today, one before the opening contest, but the real deluge of visitors was not expected until this morning.

(Continued from page 1) NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 12-Sir Thomas, in the best of spirits, said he was looking forward to the races, the first of which will be held on Saturday (today). He was enthusiastic in his appreciation of the sportsmanship of his opponents and was particularly pleased with the action of Harold S. Vanderbilt, owner and skipper of the defender Enterprise, in asking him to be aboard the defender and look her over.

"I think the Shamrock has a mighty good chance of winning," said Sir Thomas Lipton, veteran challenger for America's Cup, when questioned by a number of newspaper men.

When the commander of a United States Coast Guard cutter, who was present, informed Sir Thomas that it was his task to make sure that spectator craft did not interfere with the races on Saturday and that there would be a dozen American destroyers there to patrol the course, the sporting knight laughingly commented, "Well, I wish you would make sure that half a dozen of your destroyers get in the way of my opponent."

Sir Thomas, who was in a reminiscent mood, regaled his hearers with stories of his younger days, recalling the time when he as a mere lad he worked on a plantation in the southern states and that he had to stow away on a steamer to get back home.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The following report was presented by Comrade G. P. Nicholson, President: To the Comrades of the Prince Edward Island Branches of the Canadian Legion.

Gentlemen:- It gives me great pleasure to welcome you as delegates to this, the first Provincial Convention of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., ever held in the Province of Prince Edward Island.

As President of the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion, I take pleasure in submitting my report. The Provincial Command was formed on the 16th day of June, 1926, with the following officers: President, G. P. Nicholson. Vice-President, Dr. I. E. Croken. Secretary-Treasurer, George E. Sherren.

Executive, N. W. Lowther, G. Hughes, T. E. McNutt, H. McDougall, Leo Bradley, Dr. H. D. Johnson, and W. P. Bruce.

In 1927 a Branch of the Legion was formed at O'Leary, Prince County. This Branch is still in existence and should receive every support from sister Branches. The membership at present is the same as when the Branch was organized. In 1930 a Branch formed in Souris, King's County. The Souris Branch has been quite active, having almost doubled in membership since its inception, the membership being twenty-one.

The Charlottetown Branch under very efficient officers has continued to be the parent branch of the Province. This branch has been doing splendid work for the benefit of the Returned men, and too much credit cannot be given to its officers for the past number of years for the enthusiasm they have put into their work. At present the membership is 350.

The duties of the Provincial Executive have been more or less nominal and very different to that of other Provinces, where there are scores of sub-branches to deal with. This being the case, the work of the Provincial Executive officers has not been extensive. It is necessary, however, for certain reasons to maintain a Provincial Command, and I trust that tonight you will appoint officers who will bring new ideas and energy into the work, so that the future of the Legion in this Province may be brighter than at any time since we returned from Overseas.

RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were moved, seconded and adopted. TO HIS MAJESTY THE KING.-The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, in Provincial Convention now assembled, desires to assure His Gracious Majesty, the King, of the continued and affectionate loyalty of its members to His Person, to the Crown and Members of the Royal Family.

Meeting as we are in the historic City of Charlottetown, the cradle of Confederation, we realize most keenly the debt we owe to the Motherland and are ever determined by every means in our power to do all that is possible to strengthen the bonds of Empire which hold the far-flung possessions of His Majesty in one great Commonwealth of Nations and to ensure that Canada shall ever be in tradition, sentiment, and achievement, truly British.

TO THE DISABLED.-The Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., now in Convention assembled, earnestly proceeds to the business of the session, desiring to extend its deepest sympathy to those who are still suffering from the effects of war disabilities; those who still mourn the loss of near and dear ones, and to assure all such that the Legion stands ever ready to do all that may be done to alleviate their sufferings and to secure for them the rights to which they may be entitled.

TO IT, COL. L. R. LEFEBVRE.-Resolved that the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion of the B. E. S. L. desires to place on record its thanks and appreciation to the Dominion President, Lieutenant Colonel L. R. Lefebvre, D.S.O., A.D.C., and other officials, for their untiring efforts in bringing before Parliament the necessary legislation for the betterment of the claims of returned men, their widows and orphans.

THE FLAG.-Resolved that this Provincial Convention of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., assembled at Charlottetown desires to place on record its wish that if a distinctive Canadian Flag is to be adopted one should be designed embodying the Union Jack and Maple Leaf. Resolved that the Provincial Government be asked to take necessary steps to assure the display of our flag on all schools in this Province daily during School term.

EMPLOYMENT.-Resolved that this Provincial Convention of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., assembled at Charlottetown urges upon the Federal, Provincial and Civic authorities as well as other employees the claim which returned men have to preference when positions are vacant or employment available.

Resolved that the Provincial Command write the authorities of Halifax to procure a war trophy for the Souris Branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L.

HOSPITALIZATION. - Whereas pensioners who may be taken ill in this Province must proceed to Halifax or to the Sanatorium at Kentville, Nova Scotia for Hospitalization, be it therefore resolved that this Provincial Convention of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., assembled at Charlottetown, do urge upon the Dominion Command of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., the necessity of bringing before and urging upon the Department of Pensions and National Health the advisability and

necessity of making early provision for the Hospitalization of returned men within the Province of Prince Edward Island.

PENSIONS ACT.-Resolved that this Provincial Convention of the Canadian Legion B. E. S. L., in annual convention assembled at Charlottetown, desires to request the Dominion Command to urge upon the Federal authorities the desirability of appointing in this Province a member of the Pensions Tribunal and such other officials whose appointments are authorized by the Act or will assure to the returned men of this Province the full benefits of the Act.

RESOLVED.-That the next Provincial Convention of the Prince Edward Island Branches of the Canadian Legion B. E. S. L. be held at Charlottetown in the month of September 1931.

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
