Ray Dahlinger of Deerborn, Michigan, is the manager of Henry Ford's mammoth farm at that place. He must be on the good side of Henry as he has a half mile track on it and owns several fast record trotters and pacers.

The report of the Bay State Circuit Secretaries contains the following: "The combination of horse racing with vaudeville acts and music makes an entertainment program unequalled and superior to anything which has yet been devised. The increasing interest in this type of program at our several fairs is the best answer to the value and vitality of harness horse racing as a grandstand attraction."

The races at Toronto this fall attracted the largest attendance of spectators in years. At one afternoon's racing held recently although the weather was cold and disagreeable there were nearly two thousand spectators. Interest is kept up in a considerable manner by the fact that auction pools and books are operated.

The fastest time made by any trotter or pacer over the Bay State Circuit this year was the third heat of the Free-For-All pace at Windsor, Conn., won by Toll Gate in 2:05 3-4.

A great effort was made to secure large entry lists for the Bay State Circuit last spring and on March 5th a circular called "The Trail of Gold" was distributed to horsemen. This was supplemented by "Gold" date booklets for follow-up. Owners and drivers seemed disinterested in the trail of gold as shown by the meager entry lists.

Toledo, Ohio, which has not had grand circuit racing the past two years, has applied for dates and a thirty thousand dollar program will be offered July 10-15.

Dr. F. E. Christopher of Boston Mass., purchased Juanita 2:16 1-2 and Green Girl. These have been shipped to Willard Kelly at Charlottetown to be bred to Kalmuck next season.

Joseph McGraw, who invented the barrier, is very strong for it. In a recent American horse paper he quotes the success that handicap racing and the barrier are having in drawing crowds in Europe. He asks is there an owner in the country that could afford to pay what was paid for The Marchioness to race under our system of racing, yet they are financially much worse off in Europe, and Walter Dear has won \$40,000, and Hazelton \$30,000.

Further on he quotes the reason of lack of interest in certain cities of the U. S. for harness racing saying "Harness horsemen take delays as a matter of fact for they are used to them. At North Randall we had fourteen unnecessary delays due to bad scores, shoes off, sulky, harness and boot troubles. In three harness races it took eighty-one minutes before the horses were gotten off to a start. Such delays are bound to break the chain of interest the public had formed."

Here's a good one. An elderly German couple carrying on a milk farm in Ohio, decided to buy the farm adjoining their property. The agreed price was \$18,000, and they went to the appointed spot at the appointed time prepared to pay. PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Ont., Dec 2—Shipments from Canada of fresh killed turkeys for the Christmas season have been well received in England according to an announcement here today. It is expected that the total shipments for the Christmas and new year trade in England will amount to nearly a million pounds. In past years there have been some shipments of frozen turkeys for the holiday trade but this year's shipments have been the first to provide any substantial interest in fresh killed stock. Indications are that poultry shipments to eastern Canada from the West will be about 65 percent of last year's total owing to the low prices prevailing on the domestic market and with the export outlet at firmer prices.
