No Inquest In Perry Death

No inquest will be held into the death of Benjamin Perry, 30, found frozen to death Monday two miles west of Tignish. The Skinner's Pond fisherman was enroute to Kildare Cape when he perished in a snow storm.

Acting Coroner J.E. Cameron, a Justice of the Peace from Tignish decided an inquest was not necessary. The Acting Coroner, with R.C.M.P. Constable T.J. Keefe of Alberton Detachment and Dr. Wilfred Shea, also of Alberton, reached the spot where the body was found about midnight Monday after a difficult journey over badly drifted roads.

Perry apparently perished after the horse he was driving became entangled in a wire fence. The animal, one shoe caught in a strand of wire, was found Sunday night, two hours after Mr. Perry left Skinner's Pond. The body was not found until 1 p.m. Monday.

Reopening Of Air School

Re-opening of the ROAF Air Navigation School at Summerside, is to take place late in March of this year when the first navigation course in the post-war plan is scheduled to commence. It was announced today by Hon. Brooke Claxton, Minister of National Defence. Ground instruction only is to be given at the school at present but eventual plans call for an air navigation centre which will make it second-to-none in North America.

First courses to be given at the school have been designed to train veteran navigators and pilots as instructors for the RCAF flying schools and for the Air Navigation School itself. Specialist Navigation Courses are slated to commence next Autumn, and these will be followed by basic courses for new entry aircrew, both pilots and radio-navigators. Flights to navigation schools in the United Kingdom and in the United States will be included in the specialist course, in addition to two "high latitude" northern flights from Whitehorse, Y. T., or Churchill, Man. Purpose of these polar flights will be to provide students with practical experience in far northern flying, a task which requires special technique to overcome navigation problems peculiar to Arctic regions. The specialist course is one of the most exacting in the RCAF.

Also at Summerside will be the Research and Development Section (Navigation) of the RCAF, which will work upon development of new techniques and methods of air navigation. This section is headed by Flight Lieutenant J. G. Wright, DFC, of Liverpool, N. S., who is a graduate of the Advanced Specialist Navigation Course held at the Empire Air England. F/L Wright served for some time in the Test and Development Section at the latter school.

Commanding Officer at Summerside is S/L W. C. Langstaff, DFC, of (7 Berrymount Ave.) Toronto, and Chief Instructor is S/L W. F. Davy, of Holloway, Ont. Summerside served as a navigational training centre during the war, when the RCAF General Reconnaissance School was located there, training both RCAF and RAF aircrew in Coastal Command navigation techniques. The wartime Air Navigation School operated at Summerside for a short time in 1946, after being moved from Rivers, Man., where it was located most of the war years.

Sport Echoes from Prince County

The Summerside All-Stars, who haven't been a ball of fire in the Charlottetown Forum this season, are still Heap Big Chiefs down in their own keep. They have beaten the Charlottetown Navy 4 to 3, and the Charlottetown Abbies 5 to 4, in the Crystal Rink. The two visiting teams come down to the Western Capital under different names but looked like two peas in a pod when you looked over their playing rosters. The Abbies had two Prince of Wales boys, Dalzell and Carver, in addition to the Navy lads, but none of the famed St. Dunstan's squad, a number of whom are said to be with the Charlottetown Intermediate team, put in an appearance. We're not kidding ourselves about the potential strength of those Abegweits if they manage to get the cream of St. Dunstan's, Prince of Wales and the Navy on the ice against us at the same time. Such a team would just about take any intermediate team in the Maritimes. But we think as hard a test as they will have will be against the Summerside All-Stars. It must be remembered that the local team were without the services of Dr. Vince Grant and Charlie Delghan, two of our most potent threats, when they played the Abbies last Saturday night.

Tonight will be another banner hockey night in Summerside. The Prince of Wales Intermediates will cross sticks with our local All-Stars and the Juvenile Welshmen will play Charlie Hogan's Kinsmen Juveniles. Both games, though exhibition matches, will answer a lot of questions that fandom has been asking itself in these parts. The Navy managed to eke out a 7 to 6 win over these Prince of Wales boys, but it was only in the dying moments of the game that they were able to score the winning counter. It was that close. We have beaten Prince of Wales 6 to 5, but that was a month ago. The Welshmen may have improved a lot since then and will no doubt be looking for revenge as they will have no further opportunity of meeting us in the Charlottetown League. Undoubtedly they will go all out to even the score.

There will be a great deal of interest over the outcome of the juvenile game. Our boys scored a rather surprising win over the Welshmen, last time they were edged on local ice, but the Prince of Wales sextet in their Charlottetown League with scores that leave no doubt as to their superiority, since that time. They beat the Abbies 10 to 1 and the Kinsmen 7 to 1. Both these losing teams are ahead of our Kinsmen on the season's play. From all this it would seem that the Hoganites have a man-sized job ahead of them, but if they can beat this blue-ribbon outfit it will certainly cause their stock to soar as far as Island championship hopes are concerned. So the boys will likely play the game of their lives tonight in order to show local fandom that they are still very much in the thick of things.

One of our contemporary sports writers in commenting on the game played in the Crystal Rink on Saturday night, mentioned the fact that some of the spectators put a few "out of place" adjectives in front of one of the officials' names, and cautioned that the referee "can expel any spectator from the rink during the process of a game." Frankly we don't believe that a referee has any jurisdiction whatever over spectators, nor could he expel anyone from the rink no matter how many "out of place" adjectives were put in front of his name. Of course, like all the rest of us, he could complain to the police, and the accused person might be ejected from the rink depending on the seriousness of his offense. But anyone in the rink has that privilege.

The strange part of it is that if a spectator called another spectator or had the insulting names he calls the referee there would probably be unpleasant consequences of some sort, but seemingly it has always been the privilege of the fans to call referees and umpires everything from victims of astigmatism to highway robbers and escape with impunity. Most referees, the sensible ones at least, accept this avalanche of abuse philosophically and are happy just so long as no one starts throwing pop bottles. A year or two at refereeing might be a good training for any young man who flares into anger at the least suspicion of insult. One of the sages has said that a man is only as big as the thing that makes him angry, so you've got to hand it to the referees and umpires. They've got to be pretty big inside to take what they take and grin.
