35. Correspondence On calling up Air Plant Workers

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—(CP)—Part of the correspondence between the Department of National War Services and Fleet Aircraft, Ltd., of Port Hope, Ont., regarding the calling up of the company's employees for compulsory military training was tabled in the House of Commons today.

War Services Minister Gardiner tabled it in answer to a question from M. J. Colwell, acting house leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation. Mr. Gardiner said 40 men were affected in fact by the company's employees for compulsory military training was tabled in the House of Commons today.

The notes said the company submitted no plan outlining the most suitable time for the calling up of any employees liable for compulsory training but on Oct. 23 the Divisional War Services Registrar at Toronto was advised by the company that the sending of men to camp would cripple production.

On the same day the company was asked by the Registrar to give the call numbers of the men concerned. No reply was received until Oct. 6 when the company asked that the training of all 23 Fleet employees called up for the 30-day training period beginning Oct. 9 be postponed. This request was granted.

The notes further said that on Oct. 5 all Divisional War Services Boards were provided with a list of war industries and advised to grant postponement of training to key men engaged in these industries.
