Bessborough Urges Clean Citizenship

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—"To be born a gentleman is an accident; to live and die a gentleman is a definite and enduring achievement," declared His Excellency the Earl of Bessborough, Governor General of Canada, as his final words in his address last night as guest speaker at a brilliant function in the Central Y.M.C.A. Howard Chambers presided.

In the opinion of the distinguished speaker, "the man whose every effort is devoted to his own ends, regardless of his fellows, eventually pays a heavy price." He queried: "What are the qualities needed for success?" and continued: "Courage—to face difficulties squarely, and to overcome them; not necessarily to shirk temptation, but to repel it."

Paris Fur Merchant Visits Summerside

(Special to the Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 26.—On his first visit to Canada and incidentally to the Maritime Provinces, Leon Chapal, of General Stores, Paris, France, large fur dealer and owner of warehouses in France, was a passenger on the Maritime Express of the Canadian National Railways this morning enroute from Montreal and Quebec to Summerside, P. E. I., to attend the adjourned annual meeting of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association being held there.

Mr. Chapal, who is the head of the concern, has visited the United States on previous trips across the Atlantic but has never visited Canada before. General Stores of Paris is connected with Revillon Freres of Montreal, Que., fur traders and dealers since 1723.

Speaking with regard to the fur trade in France, Mr. Chapal stated August and September last were two record months in the Paris market, more skins being handled during those two months than for any period since the war.

An effort is being made to capture the fur trade which before the war and after has been centred in Leipzig, Germany. Before the war this was one of the great fur trading centres of Europe and there is still a considerable amount of trading done there.
