IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM A. TOWNSHEND

It is with feelings of deepest sorrow that we chronicle the death of William A. Townshend of Fortune at the age of eighty years.

Mr. Townshend until almost four years ago enjoyed robust health, but about that time he was in an automobile accident and due to injury and shock was ill since then and subsequently an invalid.

During his tedious illness he was tended with loving care and devotion by his wife and family, but all to no avail, and on July 25th his gentle spirit wended its way to his eternal home.

Possessed of great courage he exemplified wonderful cheerfulness to the end.

Mr. Townshend was one of Fortune's most highly respected residents, and a zealous worker in all that tended towards community welfare. He was of a genial disposition, ever generous charitable and kind towards his neighbors.

His funeral was conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. G. Hackin, and was largely attended. A touching tribute being beautifully rendered duet, "Face to Face" by Mr. Howard Dingwell and Mrs. A. R. Duchemin.

Mr. Townshend was an Elder of Bay Fortune United Church, an honored position that he fulfilled capably and faithfully for many years.

He is survived by his widow, one son, Ernest at home and six daughters, Mildred and Amy at home; Gladys (Mrs. George Beers); Ethel (Mrs. Albert Hutchins); Helen and Agnes all of U.S.A.; one daughter Grace (Mrs. Orlis Doone) predeceased him. Two sisters, Margaret A. Charlottetown; Mary E. (Mrs. Robert Gallagher) U.S.A.

The floral tributes were beautiful and testified to the esteem in which he was held.

Kipling Elusive Seldom Observed

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 21.—Rudyard Kipling, the veteran bard, is gaining a reputation, second only to Sir Basil Zaharoff, for elusiveness of movement and personal inaccessibility.

Only Zaharoff, the international banker and philanthropist whose contact with the general public is only through an obscure bit of news in the daily press on rare occasions can be the author of "Barrack Room Ballads" for an almost shy withdrawal from the public eye.

Now 70 years old Kipling and his life and habits are becoming a vague quantity to the England which loves him. Kipling, in fact, seems to the average Englishman part and parcel of the folklore of his country.

Scarcely a week passes without some fresh rumor about the sage of Burwash. Most of them are due to the fact that Kipling lives the life of a recluse at his Sussex estate, which is not equipped with a telephone, considered by anyone other than those with the Kipling cast of mind as an indispensable adjunct of easy, if not modern, living.

A check of police authorities at Marienbad, Czechoslovakia, developed the information that Kipling was not at that resort seriously ill, as had been reported in some sections of the American press. It was learned he had been there about a month ago, however, "feeling seedy."

Since then, members of the local Kipling Society have glimpsed the Bombay-born member of the British aristocracy of letters several times, hurrying along London streets "looking exceptionally chipper." They are sure their idol is working hard on another epic at Burwash.
