Address By Maj. T. E. MacNutt At Belfast

Major T. E. MacNutt, Charlottetown, speaking on the occasion of Remembrance Day at Belfast, outlined the views of the Canadian Legion on the national war effort. He spoke in part as follows: "The war news may at times be depressing. It was so in the last Great War. We will remember Earl Haig's famous message of 11th April, 1918, when all looked so black: 'With our backs to the wall, and believing in the justice of our cause, each one of us must fight on to the end'." "The bulldog determination of our race brought us through those dark days, and we believe that the same spirit will help carry us through to victory, as in times past. "But to win, men, tanks, guns, aeroplanes, munitions must be provided in ever increasing quantities. To do this money must be raised. We of the Legion must be ever in the forefront in every such effort in furthering the national war effort, and helping in every other possible way which we can. We hope of getting something out of it for ourselves - a symptom all too prevalent. It is what each and every one puts into the war effort that counts. "We of the Legion must, I fear, realize that the most of us are too old for service in a theatre of war. Our duty to our country is to assist in the forces of the Crown. That may be a hard duty, but duty is hard at times, and that is why we must do it. It is a duty which will be a great example to others in providing the manpower which is needed so much in this war, as in all wars, notwithstanding all the changes of modern war. "You are all aware that the Legion from coast to coast has gone on record as advocating conscription of both manpower and resources in the defence of the Empire. I believe this is right. I believe this is the only way to save our lives. I have advocated compulsory service in the Armed Forces for defence purposes. There are four fundamental duties of citizenship all of which should be either compulsory or voluntary: Defence of Country, Education of Youth, Enforcement of Law, Payment of Taxes. All of these will realize that the three duties were voluntary, yet for generations not only we in Canada, but those in the Mother Empire, have been peace-loving people, satisfied to allow the defence of the Empire to rest on those who felt it a patriotic duty to serve in the Armed Forces. Today we are paying for this unpreparedness not only in money but in precious lives. "Years ago the late Field Marshal Lord Roberts said: 'No modification of the voluntary system, no amount of lavish expenditure, no cajoling, no juggling with figures will ever produce an adequate and efficient home army on the voluntary system'. Even in the great 1st and 2nd world wars in which we were so engaged, Canada is still a great nation, the most part of a voluntary system. "The Legion, a great non-political organization, has always demanded adequate and efficient forces on land, sea and in the air for the defence of Canada and the discharge of those obligations which rest upon us as members of the British Empire. The Legion, with almost a hundred branches in Canada, believes that our present system of waging war will not meet the demands necessary to carry on total war, and have therefore urged upon the Government of Canada the necessity of immediate, complete and scientific mobilization, organization and utilization of all resources - spiritual, intellectual, natural, financial, agricultural, industrial, manpower - in such manner that Canada may be geared to produce essential goods and munitions and to wage war to her maximum capacity. That, my friends, is the considered opinion of this great organization as to how Canada should wage this war. "We, my comrades, have thus expressed our opinion and belief and we must individually and collectively endeavour to do what we can to bring it about. The task of preparing for total war is a great one and will take time. The enemy has not and will not wait. As Prime Minister Churchill said: 'There is not a week, nor a day, nor an hour to be lost.' 'Come, then, let us to the task.' 'Let us go forward together.' "Though the land" was another injunction of Churchill. We in this Province can in season plough the land, and can produce much of the foodstuffs, including bacon, which are so necessary to feed the British, especially those in the Motherland. We must determine to cheerfully pay our taxes, and then loan to the Government by the purchase of Bonds and War Savings Certificates, as much as we can of the money which has been entrusted to us. "Finally, my comrades, let us be thankful that so far we on this Continent are just outside the reach of the tentacles of that octopus, Hitler, who has dragged so much of Europe down into the depths of slavery and Hell. Let us fear no sacrifice, neglect no duty or opportunity to do what we can to bring about his defeat and downfall and a victory, which let us pray will be rounded on justice and understanding—a peace which will endure.

FORD TRUCKS SET RECORDS OF LEADERSHIP

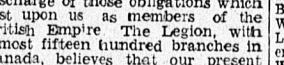
With many improvements designed to maintain the leadership record that has been theirs for the past seven years, and for 23 of 27 years, the new Ford trucks for 1942 are presented by Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited. In the new line there is a total of 68 body and chassis types ranging from the half-ton models to the heavy-duty three-tonners. New styling gives a redesigned front grille which flows into the massive fenders to create the rugged appearance so desirable in commercial trucks. Half-ton truck models are entirely new for 1942. These light trucks are similar in design and appearance to their big brother and have the same proven feature of dependable economical operation. All Ford trucks are powered with the famous V-8 engines. The half-ton models and all units up to and including the one and one-half ton models have the 40 horsepower V-8 engine, while the heavy-duty two and three-ton trucks are powered with the rugged 55 horsepower engine. Engines have been improved by redesigning water passages in the cylinder block and head, which gives more uniform cooling. The fan is now mounted above the crankshaft and revolves at higher than the old speed. Larger exhaust pipes and refinements of manifold reduce back pressure and contribute to improved efficiency. Radiator strain has been relieved and the front end strengthened by a new front cross member. The new front end radiator mounting yoke. This also adds to the support of the front fenders, grille and hood sides. Other improvements in the Ford trucks include a new one-type rubber cushion rear engine mounting in all units with three-speed transmission. This tends to reduce vibration and road noises in the cab. Greater frame rigidity is achieved by a new front cross member, the one and one-half, two and three-ton units. Road clearance beneath the radiator and front grille has been increased. Bronzed brushed spring shackles with hardened steel pins are also new. To aid wartime production, Ford trucks are no longer available in Delux models but all panel and cab models are standardly equipped with dual electric air horns, windshield wipers, dual sun visors, clear lighters and other convenient fittings. Regular trucks are available in three wheelbase lengths with nominal ratings of one and one-half, two and three tons. Wheelbase lengths of the one and one-half ton trucks are 134 and 158-inch. In two and three ton units there is also a 176-inch wheelbase to accommodate larger bodies for bulkier loads. There is a special 134-inch dump truck chassis with auxiliary springs, reinforced frame and dual frame and dual rear wheels as standard equipment. This is available in either two or three-ton ratings.
