Mr. Stewart proceeded to say that Parliament must succumb to the Postal Workers in order to avoid trouble.

Mr. Stewart exclaimed, "Parliament is going to reserve to itself the right to run this country. Surely we cannot surrender that right no matter what we think about it and I for one am prepared to discuss with these men tonight, tomorrow or at any time, their legitimate grievances and to sit down with them and go into the matter."

Hon. G. P. Graham, Minister of Railways, went further. If, he said Postal Employees were not prepared to await the report of the Civil Service Commission for all the services, but instead of putting the business of the country into a great turmoil, "then they will have to take the responsibility."

T. L. Church, Conservative of North Toronto, initiated the discussion on a motion to adjourn. He held the House all the afternoon and was continued in the evening.

Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Opposition Leader, argued that the facility with which the Government had met the demands of highly paid officials for more pay had considerable to do with creating dissatisfaction among lower paid employees.
