JOE IRVINE ROVERSTAKE PUT ON NEW MATINEE RACES AT S' SIDE

IS BEATEN BY SECOND GAME WORLD MARK VIC LANGILLE OF LEAGUE

Losers Outclasses Opponent But Hits Him After Gong.

PORT ELGIN, N. B., June 24 — The scheduled ten-round bout here last night between Joe Irvine, of St. John, and Vic Langille, of Springhill, N. S., came to a sudden and unsatisfactory conclusion, after the bell rang for the end of the first round, when the Saint John man was disqualified for fouling.

Langille did not appear to be in shape to meet an opponent such as Irvine, and was clearly outclassed. The pace in the first round was fast and the Springhill fighter took a lot of punishment during the three minutes that he lasted. He was floored on two occasions by Irvine, whose timing was excellent and whose punches were carrying steam.

The clinch came when Langille dropped for the second time from a hard left to the head. At the count of nine he came back to his knees, and waved Irvine back to his corner. Irvine went back, and when Langille got up, came out and got him with a right to the body.

The bell rang, but Langille kept coming in and Irvine caught him with a hard left to the jaw and Langille went down again.

Langille's manager claimed a foul and Referee Callender awarded the bout to Langille. The decision met with the disapproval of the fans, who called for Langille to go on with the fight. The judges offered him ten minutes to get into shape, but he refused to continue.

MacKenzie and Bolger Hit Homers Last Night—Score was 8-4.

In a snappy exhibition of baseball, the Rovers last evening won their second victory of the season over the All Stars by a score of 8 to 4. A succession of base-hits including MacKenzie's homer in the sixth gave the Rovers the game. The All Stars who opened the game, suspiciously in the first with two runs, played great ball all the way and never gave up trying until the last ball was pitched.

George Ayers, All Star pitcher and newcomer to the City League, made a fine showing in his first appearance. With more experience and coaching Ayers will develop into a pitcher of the first rank.

McNell and Carbonek, turned in their usual steady exhibition for the Rovers.

LONDON, June 24.—Dr. Jack Wright, ranking number one player of Canada, west down to defeat in the opening round of the Wimbledon tennis championships today before the brilliant playing of Wilbur "Junior" Coen of Kansas City. The scores were 2-6, 9-7, 6-4, 6-2.

"Plucky" Made 2.06 1/4 For Four-Year-Old Trotters.

STURBRIDGE, June 24 — The world's record for four-year-old trotters over a half-mile track was lowered to 2.06 1/4 here by Plucky in the second heat of the 2.09 class and was earned in a real horse race.

The decision in giving the heat to the wonderful son of Peter Volo did not meet with the approval of many persons in the grandstand who saw Bronx in at the rail first.

Plucky, in winning the first heat from Bennett Volo in 2.07, sliced two seconds off the Cedar Lake Park course record, making his second mile the performance of a truly great trotter. Though only a four-year-old this is Plucky's third campaign on Eastern twice arounds, and seldom has he failed to race well, but somehow the general belief has been that while a race horse of the highest quality he did not have the extreme whizz for a champion.

Plucky has had all his training from his driver, Ed. Kirby of Goshen, N. Y. He is owned by Leo Cahill of Elmira, N. Y.

Bronx, from Aubrey Rodney's stable, trotted a surprising heat in the record mile. Off on top Rod took the little Belwin, guiding to the front and kept him right there almost to the last stride. He was at the rail and Plucky had to trot around him on the upper turn. Bronx lunged on and Kirby had to give his prize pupil a rallying drive to win.

Rodney landed his pony first in the third mile in another close finish that pleased the crowd.

Widow Grattan, as the experts figured, was the best of the 2.10 pacers, but she had to be good for Jeanette Royal, was able to make her the second mile of the race in 2.05 1/4, a new record for the track.

Fred W. Woodman, of Haverhill, half owner of the Widow, added to his speed holdings after Harry Brusse had handed the boys a surprise by winning the three-year-old trot with Volomo by paying Joseph Roberts of Worcester \$8,000 for the son of Peter Volo and Lema Moko.

The big brown colt, a great-grandson of Nancy Hanks won comfortably in 2:11 3/4, 2:11.

Wants Horse To Stay Sober In The Future

TORONTO, Ont., June 24 — When charged with keeping liquor in an illegal place, Edward A. Bernthey, a trainer at a local race track, explained that he gave it to the horses.

"I wondered what was the matter," said Edward Murphy, assistant crown attorney. "Some of the horses I bet on were drunk."
