AERIAL SERVICE.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Mr. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, replying to criticisms of the air service, in the House of Commons, admitted that the provisions which had been considered sufficient at the beginning of the war had to be materially developed. He said, however, that the service was now being supplemented far more rapidly than was the danger it was organized to meet. There had been a great strain, Mr. Balfour continued, on the supply of anti-aircraft guns. The development of an aerial offensive had not been foreseen before this war, but the naval air service was now of great dimension.

"I cannot say," Mr. Balfour said, "that there will be a discontinuance of the attacks on London, but no one would suggest that such methods of terrorism are going in the slightest degree to shake the resolution of the British people." Mr. Balfour frankly admitted that he was much surprised to discover, when appointed First Lord of the Admiralty, that he was responsible for the aerial service, which had only a remote connection with naval work. If the Government had set to work three or four years before the war, with full knowledge of the requirements of aerial warfare, he said, the defenses of London would undoubtedly have been much better organized, but he hoped that the organization was now in a fair way to become complete. The changes already made had been very great, and all were in the way of dealing adequately with the new and great responsibility. No better assurance could be given the House that the defence of London against air raids were receiving the most careful attention than the appointment of Admiral Sir Percy Scott to take charge of the gunnery defenses. In respect to the protection taken against Zeppelins, London had been unfavorably contrasted with Paris. Such a comparison was most unfair. Paris was a fortified city, in fact a great fortress, whereas London was not a fortified city. None knew that better than the Germans and, under the rules of civilized warfare, London should be immune from the attacks to which she had been subjected. But he confidently hoped that the efforts of the Admiralty would lead to a great diminution in the danger which might be anticipated from German airships.

NICOTINLESS TOBACCO NEXT

Tobacco in which the percentage of nicotine has been reduced to only 1.3 per cent. is being grown at the United States Agricultural Station at Landisville, Penn. The denarcotization of tobacco is the result of only three years' experiments performed under the direction of Dr. W. W. Garner, of the United States Bureau of Plant Industry, who hopes to grow tobacco that is entirely free from nicotine. The tobacco retains its original flavor and pleasing qualities and is entirely harmless. Dr. Garner's method of producing a nicotineless tobacco was according to a process of cultural selection. Three years ago a number of tobacco stocks were analyzed and found to have an average nicotine content of 3.5 per cent. The seed of the plant having the lowest nicotine content was selected and cultivated. Specimens of plants grown from these were selected and cultivated. The process was repeated until the nicotine content had been reduced to 1.3 per cent.

SYNOD IN SESSION.

TORONTO, Sept. 16.—The General Synod of the Anglican Church this morning after the adoption of the minutes of the previous meeting, proceeded to appoint a nominating committee for the purpose of striking the various committees for the transaction of detail business. A memorial from Huron diocese asking the replacing of the second verse of the National Anthem in the Hymnal, was taken up and more discussion than was anticipated and occasioned considerable heat. A marked difference of opinion as to the spirit of this verse developed. Dean Evans, of Montreal, made a most impressive verse urging the insertion, in which he had powerful support from Archbishop Gwynne of Toronto, who declared that at St. Paul's the congregation would sing all the verses of "God Save the King," whether the Synod approved its use or not. The Rev. W. J. Boyd, of Edmonton, took the ground that the great mass of the German people were not to be so vigorously condemned as was generally done and he regarded the condemnatory verse of the National Anthem as being unchristian and unnecessary as an expression of patriotism. John Rutherford, of Clinton, Ont., took the ground that the nominating committee, or other peoples, with whom Great Britain might be at some time in conflict, are not wholly worthy of such stringent condemnation. Dean Murray, Winnipeg, deprecated the spirit which seemed to actuate the verse and suggested that nothing should be done which might stimulate a spirit of vindictiveness. Dean Lloyd, Halifax, said that to reinstate the words of the verse left out by the Hymnal revision of 190 would be to take a retrograde step and would not be in sympathy with the tenor of Edward Grey's speeches at the outbreak of the war, which breathed the regret with which Britain drew the sword, and the violation it was to British ideals of peace. To replace the verse would mean that we placed ourselves on the same platform as Germany in withdrawing ourselves to the level of the Hun. Memorials from New Westminster and Ottawa have been referred to the committee on prayer book revision while one from New Westminster regarding work among the Orientals of that diocese will be taken up at the general discussion on home missions on Friday morning.

FINE FOR GIVING LIQUOR TO SOLDIERS ON WAY TO THE FRONT.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—The treating of soldiers on the eve of their departure, or on their return from the front, which has become a notorious evil, is likely to receive a check by an early prohibition order for the Metropolitan district. A request for such an order has been made by Major General Sir Francis Lloyd, commanding the London district, to the Central Control Board. The order already operates in certain districts where Government work is being carried on, and the restrictions and penalties are severe.

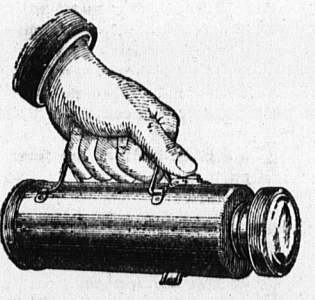

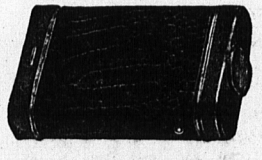

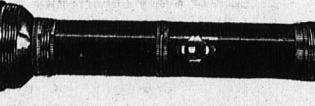

FRANCE OVERRUN WITH WILD GAME.

PARIS, Sept. 20.—Because of the prohibition imposed by the French Government upon hunting, wild animals and birds have multiplied so rapidly during the summer that crops in the fields and in orchards and gardens in various forest regions have been ravaged. The menace has become so serious that the Government authorities are now killing rabbits, hares, pheasants and other animals and birds which have fed upon the growing crops. The killing is done on specified days by those in the communes who have proper authorization. The huntsmen act collectively, no individual sportsman being allowed to go out for game. Guns are not used in the work except under the supervision of gentlemen and then only when other means of disposing of the game, such as traps and ferrets are not available. Wherever possible, the game is taken alive and transferred to other parts of the county for re-stocking purposes.
