RILEY—STEAD—The marriage of Hazel Vera, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Stead, of Hunter River, P. E. I., took place on Tuesday, June 24th. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Edward Scraggs, at the Mansie, Medicine Hat, Alberta. After a short honeymoon trip, motoring to some of the chief places of interest in the province, the happy couple returned to Granlea, where the groom has large farming interests, and where they will reside. Their many friends wish them many years of wedded happiness and prosperity in their new home.

Dr. Baird was heard yesterday morning by a fine congregation at St. James. His text was "Walls about Zion, and the powers thereof." He touched upon many points of supreme interest to the Presbyterian Church. As Moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. Baird commences his visitation of the Church in Canada this week in Prince Edward Island. Yesterday afternoon he preached in Brookfield and in the evening in Summerside. He will speak Monday evening in Alberton, returning to the eastern section where he will address meetings in the various churches at Caledonia, Belfast, Cardigan and other places. He returns to Pictou on Friday. Dr. Baird spoke in a fine clear, ringing voice. The congregation was struck by his masterly grasp not only of the church's ecclesiastical problems, but also of her legal status and the far-reaching possibilities of the recent finding before the Privy Council. We trust and pray that our moderator will have a pleasant and prosperous itinerary as he visits our church from Newfoundland to Victoria. In view of the many demises in our churches and in the city in general, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, D. D., spoke very fittingly on St. Paul's words, "I am persuaded that neither death nor life, shall separate us from the love of Christ."

On behalf of the S. S. Superintendent and teachers Dr. Fulton extended thanks to all who assisted in service and in transportation of the children to the grounds at Lewis' Point, where Zion annual picnic was held. We also appreciate the kindness of the Lewis family in extending to us the privilege of occupying such suitable and beautiful grounds. At the morning service Zion male quartette rendered the selection "Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken," and a male octette sang, "Remember me O mighty One," by Klembe. Those taking part in the octette were, Mr. Harry Craswell and Rev. Scott Fulton, 1st tenor, Messrs. Jack McLeod and Leonard Sutherland, 2nd tenor, Earl Carmody and Malcolm McKinnon, 1st bass, Norman MacPherson and Harry MacDougal, 2nd bass. Both numbers were excellently rendered. At the evening service, in keeping with the thought of the sermon, "O Sweetly Solemn Thought," by Ambrose was very feelingly sung by Mr. Harry Craswell. The choir rendered the anthem "Trust in Him Always," Miss Flora Campbell taking the soprano solo in her usual capable manner.

The remains of the late Bishop Louis J. O'Leary, which are lying in state in the parlour of the Palace, were viewed by thousands of the mourning parishioners of Charlottetown yesterday. The body will remain in the Palace till 8:30 this evening, when it will be translated to the Basilica, where Matins and lauds of the dead will be chanted. The funeral service will take place Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, Daylight Saving Time. Yesterday prayers for the dead were said at all the masses.

Among the clerics arriving today in connection with the funeral service tomorrow are Archbishop O'Donnell, of Halifax, Bishop Morrison, of Antigonish, and Bishop Renouf, of St. John's Newfoundland, Bishop Conetes, Three Rivers, Que., and Bishop Alexander MacDonald.

The third Bishop was Rt. Rev. Peter McIntyre, consecrated Bishop in 1860 and who was head of the diocese for thirty-one years, his death taking place in 1891. He was succeeded by the Rt. Rev. James Charles McDonald, D.D., who had been consecrated Titular Bishop of Irina in 1890 and Coadjutor Bishop of Charlottetown. He became Bishop in 1891, and passed away in 1912 and was succeeded by the Rt. Rev. Henry J. O'Leary, D.D., consecrated Bishop on May 22, 1913. In August, 1920, Bishop O'Leary was promoted to be Archbishop of Edmonton, Alberta and he was succeeded as Bishop by the late Rt. Rev. Louis J. O'Leary, who had been appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Chatham, N. E., in January, 1914, and consecrated Titular Bishop of Hierapolis on June 2 of that year. In August, 1920, the late Bishop O'Leary became the Bishop of Charlottetown in succession to his brother.

The funeral of the late Rev. S. J. MacDonald took place from his old home at Monticello St. Margaret's, Tuesday morning, 8th inst. It was very largely attended, not only by the people of his native parish, but also by many others who came to pay this last tribute of respect to the deceased priest. Over forty priests were in attendance, from all over the diocese.

Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. C. McLean, P.A., V.G., with the following assistants: Rev. John Arch. McDonald, Deacon; Rev. A. L. Sinnott, Sub-Deacon; Rev. Dr. McMahon, Master of Ceremonies; Censer-bearer, Rev. P. Walsh; Acolytes, Rev. Peter Gallant and Rev. Walter McGuigan.

In the choir Rev. Theodore Gallant was organist, and singing was led by Rev. Bernard Gillis, D. D., assisted by Rev. Basil Croken and Rev. Urban Gillis.

A sermon appropriate to the occasion was preached by Rev. Father Kenny, S. J., who was conducting the retreat for the priests of the diocese at St. Dunstan's University.

Service at the grave was conducted by Rev. K. G. MacPherson, P. P., with the choir already named. Honorary pall bearers were: Rev. A. J. McIntyre, Rev. J. F. Johnston, Rev. M. Monaghan, Rev. Reginald McDonald, Rev. Fr. Arsenault, and Rev. Michael Francis.

Active pall bearers were cousins of the deceased: Messrs. John D. H. McDonald, Douglas McDonald, Angus O. McDonald, Hugh A. McDonald, Joseph A. McDonald and Daniel McDonald.

The funeral was under direction of Undertaker A. A. Hennessy of Charlottetown, this being the first time that a motor hearse was used at St. Margaret's.

Many Mass Cards and other tokens of sympathy were received by the sorrowing relatives, of which particulars will appear shortly.

EXTRADITION PROCEEDINGS—About midnight on Saturday Judge Duffy signed a warrant for the arrest of a former Prince Edward Islander under the Extradition Act on a warrant of manslaughter issued in the State of Maine, arising out of the death of a man in an automobile accident. On Sunday the Chief of Police and the deputy sheriff from Maine arrested the defendant at his home and brought him to Charlottetown. At midnight last night the prisoner signed a Consent and Waiver before Judge Duffy, agreeing to return to the United States without extradition proceedings and stand his trial. The prisoner alleges it was an unavoidable accident and that he is in no way responsible.

CALL TO ST. JAMES CHURCH—A congregational meeting of St. James Church was held in the Church Hall last evening—the interim moderator of the Kirk session, Rev. M. Scott Fulton presiding at the outset, and afterwards Mr. F. S. Wilkins. The resignation of the Rev. W. Bruce Muir was heard with deep sorrow and sympathy expressed with him in his illness, the hope being expressed that he would soon be restored to health. Provision was made for a retiring allowance from the congregation in augmentation of the allowance to which Mr. Muir is entitled for the Old and Infirm Members Fund. A call was submitted by the Session Clerk Mr. D. A. McKinnon in favor of the Rev. R. Moorehead Legate, Montreal, who has been acting minister for some time, and unanimously approved, the call being signed by all present. An opportunity will be given to all members and adherents to sign the call up till Thursday when the Presbytery meets at Malpeque to consider it. Messrs. W. K. Rogers, A. S. Morrison and John I. Thomson, elders, were appointed to further the call before the Presbytery.

The burial services of the late Bishop O'Leary takes place at St. Dunstan's Basilica at 10 o'clock this morning when Pontifical High Mass will be celebrated by Archbishop Henry J. O'Leary, of Edmonton, assisted by Rev. Dr. McLeelan, as high priest, by Rev. N. Polier, and Rev. Chas. McCarthy, as deacon and sub-deacon of the Mass; Rev. Dr. Murphy and Rev. R. MacKenzie, as deacon and sub-deacon of Honour. The sermon will be preached by Bishop Morrison, of Antigonish. Absolution will be pronounced over the body by the celebrant, by Archbishop O'Donnell, Bishop Alexander MacDonald, Bishop Chaisson, and Bishop Reneau. From the Basilica the funeral procession will proceed to the cemetery where interment will take place.

Last evening the remains were taken in solemn procession from the Palace to the Basilica, where they were received at the entrance by Rt. Rev. Monsignor Maurice MacDonald, assisted by Rev. Walter McGuigan, and Rev. M. E. Francis. The remains were exposed in the Sanctuary, where matins and lauds of the dead were chanted.

A large number of dignitaries arrived yesterday to attend the funeral. Among them were Archbishop O'Donnell, Halifax; Bishop Le Blanc, St. John; Bishop Chaisson, Chatham; Bishop Compiout, Three Rivers; Bishop Reneau, St. Georges, Newfoundland; Bishop Alexander MacDonald, Monsignors Garneau, representing Cardinal Rouleau, of Quebec; O'Keefe, Chatham, Trudelle, Chatham, Melanson, Campbellton, Guertin, St. James, Memramcook.

DEATH OF DR. MACDONALD—The death occurred of Mr. Stewart today of Dr. John C. Macdonald, a well known and highly respected physician, whose passing at the comparatively early age of 55 will be deeply deplored by a wide circle of friends. Dr. Macdonald formerly practiced at York, and both in his professional capacity, and as a resident who took an active interest in community welfare, he won a warm place in the hearts of the people.

The July term of the Supreme Court at Georgetown opened yesterday with Chief Justice Mathieson presiding. The Grand Jury were empaneled as follows: Martin MacKinnon (foreman); John Fitzpatrick, Patrick P. Morrison, William Steele, Charles Macdonald, Wallace Aiken, A. A. Macdonald, John Fraser S. McLeod, Charles Parker, A. J. McAdams, and Spencer Moore.

His Lordship in addressing the jury dealt especially with the case of the King vs. Anti and Passell, charged with the murder of Rodriguez, boatman of the steamer "Winding Gulf." He reviewed the circumstances in connection with that case and the evidence the jury would consider. His Lordship also fully explained the duties of the Grand Jury.

True bills were found against each of Anti and Passell. The former will appear for trial today. Messrs. David Mathieson, K. J. Martin, and S. S. Heenan will appear for the accused. Mr. Thane Campbell, Attorney-General will conduct the prosecution.

DEDICATION OF HISTORICAL FLAG, PRESENTED TO UNITED CHURCH—At the morning service in Trinity United Church, Summerside, on Sunday morning the Union Jack presented by Capt. L. A. Moore of Summerside to the church in memory of his father, the late Colonel Frederick Strong Moore of Charlottetown, was dedicated. Rev. Mr. Fraser, pastor of the church, read the dedicatory address and prayer. Dr. Clarence McKinnon, principal of Pine Hill College, Halifax, preached a very impressive sermon suitable for the occasion and also spoke on the work of Pine Hill. The choir rendered special music. Miss Jean Wright and Mr. Roy Smallman taking the solo parts in the hymn "King of Love My Shepherd Is." The flag presented by Capt. Moore had seen active service both in the South African War and also in the Great War. Many of the fallen heroes of P. E. Island had been covered by the flag on the battle field. The pastor and congregation are very grateful to Capt. Moore for his beautiful gift.

Sadly and slowly a mourning concourse, representative of his entire episcopal district, followed in the funeral train of His Lordship, Right Rev. Louis J. O'Leary, Bishop of Charlottetown, who was laid to rest yesterday morning in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. The funeral, which took place from St. Dunstan's Basilica, was the largest held in the city for many years, and was attended by visiting clergy from many points in the Dominion who assembled to pay tribute to the beloved dignitary.

The Basilica was thronged with citizens of all denominations, many being unable to gain admittance. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning Solemn Pontifical Requiem High Mass was celebrated at the Basilica by Most Reverend Henry J. O'Leary, of Edmonton, brother of the deceased, assisted as follows: High Priest, Rev. G. McLeelan, D. D.; Deacons of Honor, Rev. James Murphy, D. D., Rev. R. V. McKenzie; Deacon of the Mass, Rev. N. Poirer; Sub-Deacon of the Mass, Rev. C. Mc-

Carthy, Master of Ceremonies, Rev. P. McMahon, D. D.; Censor bearer, Rev. Andre Arsenault, Aclytes, Rev. J. A. Sullivan, and Urban Gillis.

An eloquent and touching sermon was delivered by Right Rev. James Morrison, Bishop of Antigonish, who took for his text, St. John, 17, the passage containing the prayer of the Lord uttered before His death and passion. The assemblage is gathered, he stated, to offer prayer for the departed soul of one dear to all. It is appointed for all to die, and after that the judgment. Therefore in the presence of death, the Reverend said, to touch on a few points in connection with the deceased. An appreciation of education, a desire to uplift the citizens, were outstanding characteristics of the deceased prelate. Bishop Morrison stated, Outstanding among many actions which have proved his loyalty to the people and his love for the welfare of his country was the building of the hospital for suffering humanity. In the death of the Bishop his people have sustained a severe loss, but it is to be hoped that he will always be remembered in their prayers.

The male choir of the Basilica was augmented by a number of the visiting clergy, rendering the Requiem Mass with much feeling. Previous to the commencement of Mass the choir rendered the "Miseremini Mei" Mr. W. J. Brown sustaining the solo.

Final Absolutions were pronounced by Archbishop O'Leary, Archbishop O'Donnell, Halifax, Bishop Chaisson, Chatham, Bishop Renouf, St. Georges, Newfoundland and Bishop Alexander MacDonald.
