THE VICEREGAL LODGE.

(From the London Chronicle.) The Viceroyal Lodge in Phoenix Park, Dublin, which again figures in the news, has had a comparatively eventless history during the century and a half that it has housed the Lord Lieutenant. This is chiefly because Dublin Castle is the home of the Viceroy during the Dublin season, and both socially and politically, the "Castle" attracts most attention. Set in charming grounds of 160 acres in the heart of the 2,000 acres of Phoenix Park, it has generally been curiously remote from storm and stress. One of its most striking scenes was in 1821, when a mob followed George IV. there from Dublin. The crowd swarmed into the grounds and the king appeared on the balcony to address them. He declared his affection for the Irish people, and wound up by asking them to go away, and drink his health in Irish whiskey, as he was about to drink theirs.

## RAILWAYS AND SOW-THISTLE.

Artificial conditions sometimes are involved in the otherwise inexplicable distribution of a noxious weed, just as geographical factors sometimes strangely control the spread of insect pests. Colorado is a great potato state, but as an economic factor in potato production the well-known Colorado beetle or potato bug is much more talked about. The potato bug, some well-travelled persons have erroneously thought, is ubiquitous in the potato-growing regions of North America. But it isn't. British Columbia in the Pacific Northwest is an important potato producer. But the potato bug, travelling a good many years, hasn't got there yet.


A strange fact the observant tourist observes in Saskatchewan that wonderful district of Western Canada, is that the worst weed pest, the perennial sow-thistle, is practically confined to railway yards. Then a second interesting point is noticed. Along the Canada Pacific Railway almost all patches of the weed are on the north side of the track.

Montreal stocks are heavy, but much of the butter is said to be held for outside account, and this may soon be shipped out.
