## FAREWELL SERMON

### Delivered last Night in Baptist Church

#### BY REV. C. W. COREY

##### A Review of his Five Years' Pastorate and an Earnest Impressive Charge to his Congregation. — Address and Presentation From the Junior Union.

Last evening Rev. C. W. Corey preached his farewell sermon in the Baptist church. The crowded house was one of the many evidences of the esteem in which the reverend gentleman is held by his people. The service followed the usual form, special music, however, being furnished by the choir. At the close of the service the choir led the congregation in singing, "God be with you till we meet again."

Rev. Mr. Corey took for his text, Gal. V: 1—"Said fast in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made you free; and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage."

Briefly reviewing the pastorate of five years he said about \$2,300 per year had been raised for all purposes. About \$1,200 had been paid on the church debt; eighty-nine have been added to the church; twenty-three of the congregation have died, three of whom were deacons of the church; by death and removal from the city about 100 have gone out from the congregation. The Junior Union organized in April was the outcome of special services of spiritual quickening. This he said would be one of the hardest features of his work to leave. Two young men had been licensed to preach. The true record of spiritual work, however, can be found only in heaven, unmarred by the soil of human fingers.

He said he had sought to make his ministry as broad as the Kingdom of Christ. So while the individual at home has been ministered to he had reminded the church of her duty to India. At home he had sought to ally himself with the work of social reform, it being the duty of Christians to be good citizens as well as good church members.

He had not hesitated to identify himself with religious and philanthropic work outside his own congregation. Here he had not failed to receive the highest respect and sympathy. He had especially sought to lead his congregation out in temperance work. The greatest evil of society to-day and the curse of the world is the vice of intemperance. By the help of God he would not be silent on it. If Quebec, to the burning disgrace of the Catholic church, would cast a majority of 35,000 for the existence of the saloon the Baptist body by his help would lead the way to something better, the liberation of men from the thralldom of the saloon.

It's purpose had been to minister to and not to please men. To transform and not to conform is the business of the church. The preacher is called to cut as well as to heal. Those that yielded to the call of the truth had been drawn nearer to him. It would not be surprising if with some, while still hugging the selfishness it had been the reverse. For the welfare of these he was still solicitous and prayed for them. He said he had nothing sensational to present. What he had not the courage to attack during his pastorate he would not yield to the weakness to attack now that it was his last utterance as pastor. He would leave with them a message of love and encouragement.

"Standfast"—we are to be pillars of strength. The weather-vane type of Christian is too much in evidence. All things to all men in the worldly sense soon becomes nothing to God. The man who is afraid of being dubbed "crank" will never amount to anything. In Christian life we are to bring men to us, and not permit men to bend us to them. As salt but not as salt without its savor are we to be.

We are to stand fast in "liberty" not license—license is the spirit of the age, men are asking to be saved with special favors. They are after indulgences not submission. In doctrine they are slipping the old gospel in the face. This pecking at the old truths is not evidence of progress but of doubt. The old doctrines were good enough for Christ and peace. They are surely quite sufficient for us. So far as your doctrines, your discipline and your life and we will come to you, says the worldly spirit. The world is turning men's heads to-day. Mammon is a great factor in the church by the compromising spirit of the membership. What others say and do is not law for you necessarily. You might be enslaved thereby.

The freedom of love is what we should seek, not relaxation of labor. Christian service becomes a pleasure to such. Love is the fulfillment of the law. To such as are thus led the obstacles of the way contribute to their progress. One said to Augels "Why do the authorities ask that a certain look be in the street?" He replied, "Give it to me and I will shape it into beautiful angels with wings." Such is the furnishing of love that the very obstacles of our feet provide us with material for advancement.

On Friday evening the members of the Junior Union, mere boys and girls, invited Rev. Mr. Corey and Mrs. Corey to the Baptist Schoolroom, where R. S. Bethune on behalf of the boys, presented Mr. Corey with an address and an elegant fountain pen, and Elsie Nicholson on behalf of the girls, presented Mrs. Corey with a large and beautiful bouquet. After this, confectionery in abundance was passed around. The whole affair was under the discreet direction of the children themselves, and speaks very highly of the esteem in which Mr. and Mrs. Corey are held by even the youngest people of the church. DEAR PASTOR,  
We, the members of the Junior Union of the Charlottetown Baptist Church, are very sorry that you are about to depart from our midst. For to you we are indebted for the existence of our Junior Union and for what it is to-day. In conclusion, we beg you to kindly accept this small token of our regard and love.

## A STRONG MAJORITY

### Take Their Stand For Prohibition

#### ONLY QUEBEC REMAINS

##### In Opposition to the Act and Its Adverse Majority is Greatly Over Balcanced by the Large Favorable Majorities of the Other Provinces.

MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—[Special]—With some polls incomplete the prohibition vote over the Dominion stands for 65,815, against 36,353.

Majority for prohibition 29,462. Every province but Quebec favors prohibition. Latest majorities are Ontario for 16,162, Nova Scotia 18,404, New Brunswick 16,735, Island 8,559, Manitoba 3,154, Northwest 2,024, British Columbia 777, Quebec against 36,353.

### EXHUMING COLUMBUS.

#### Removal of the Remains Under a Veil of Secrecy.

Havana, Sept. 29.—Mystery and secrecy surround all the official acts of the Spanish Government. Especially was this the case in exhuming the remains of Columbus, and this fact has caused much unfavorable comment, and given rise to grave rumors which, though unconfirmed, appear to have some foundation, as there has been no attempt at denial from any source. The removal of the remains, which should certainly have been a public ceremony, was veiled in the deepest mystery and was effected behind the closed doors of the Cathedral, which was guarded by an armed force. Few of the authorities were present, the names of those who were to attend being handed to the chief of police the night before in General Blanco's own hand-writing. The chief of police suggested that comments would be made by the press upon the secrecy of the proceedings and asked whether it would not be advisable to allow representatives of the newspapers to be present. To this General Blanco emphatically refused to accede, telling the chief of police to limit himself exclusively to the list of guests which had been handed to him.

No official account of the ceremony or statement regarding the condition of the remains has been made public; but it has leaked out from an almost authoritative source, that they are not in exactly the same condition as when they were placed in the niche. When the remains were placed in the mausoleum a small casket was enclosed, containing coins, gold and silver medals, precious stones and rolls of parchment, as was then the custom on the occasion of a burial. It appears that this casket has been tampered with and rifled of its contents—gold, further, that only portions of the remains are left. Gossip, scandal, and speculation are rife, the exact truth of which the authorities make no effort to affirm or contradict.

Further explanation, however, is to the effect that secrecy was given to the ceremony because a cable despatch received here reported that General Toral had been murdered in Madrid the day before, and fears were entertained that disorders might occur if the public and military came together in great numbers.

Some of the more rabid Spaniards go the length of saying that the whole ceremony was a farce.
