with her for a few weeks at one time. Last summer they lived on Fitzroy Street in Miss Malone's house.

Witness said she would not visit Jeremiah's house as his wife was "too cross a woman." Neither did Jeremiah's wife visit her home although she was at the door sometimes. On one occasion she broke the door with "a great big hammer" witness stated.

Continuing she said she and Jerry's wife were not on good terms. Witness and Jerry talked all the time in French.

Painting at the Time  
The week of July 18 Isidore and Jerry were painting at Beach Grove Inn, she said Jerry got many meals with her at that time. Besides being a painter, Jeremiah was a musician and had played in bands. The two, Jeremiah and Isidore, were always friendly and were so while at her place on the night of July 13, witness continued. She said she had intended telephoning the police about a week or so before since "she was in Rustico."

Continuing she told of the trouble between Jeremiah and Campbell which had taken place at her house. She took Jerry out to the kitchen and Mrs. Dunn followed. Witness said she did not see Jeremiah with a knife. There was no mention of the weapon.

Isidore and Jerry went away in the car. Jerry's wife came to the front door. The men came back late and took her home. Witness said she had intended telephoning someone to come and take Jerry's wife off the premises. This was "pretty near one o'clock." There was no other going further.

Jeremiah had told her he would come back to sleep at her house, witness continued. In a few minutes he came back. Isidore drove him as far as her gate. He did not come in but went away towards Prince Street. Isidore had driven away.

Witness stated that on many occasions Jeremiah had complained to her that he was having trouble with his wife. He had complained about his wife going out with other men. Jerry had gone to Boston and stayed for two or three months while his wife remained in Charlottetown.

Witness said there had been some talk of Jerry trying to get into the Army. She had gone to see about it herself. Jerry's wife was anxious for him to go.

Had Lived At Rocky Point  
Jerry had lived at Rocky Point one summer and witness had visited there. She had seen things about Jerry's wife while there and had told him but he did not mind.

When Jeremiah was away another man was chasing a woman. He noticed this when he was between Edward and Cumberland Street on Fitzroy Street.

Man Chased Woman  
Witness said the man was chasing the woman across Fitzroy Street in a zig zag course. He heard a woman shout and started running towards them. The woman screamed. When he got opposite the Forum the man had caught up with the woman at the corner of Weymouth and Fitzroy Street—they were on the lawn on the south side between the sidewalk and the house.

Continuing he said the man ran back across the street and when opposite him said "You'll get the same thing." He did not recognize the man when he passed. He was between 30 and 40 and fairly tall. He did not see anything in the man's hand.

Witness told of going over towards the woman, taking her who she was, and taking her back to her home assisted by Mr.
