

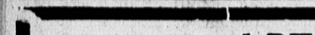

Britain Would Aid 50,000 To Come To Canada

LONDON, May 7.—The willingness of the British Government to pay fifty per cent of the cost of transporting to Canada 50,000 women and children whose men folk are now in the Dominion is producing no comment in Canadian official circles here.

J. Bruce Walker, Director of European Emigration, told British United Press today that it was the first he had heard of the scheme and that the matter was entirely one for decision at Ottawa.

Hitherto Canada has confined her assistance to emigrants for domestic service or farm work and has been most reluctant to increase her financial obligations in this respect.

The British Government, particularly the Ministry of Labor, has been endeavoring for a long time to get Canada to increase her contribution for emigration purposes and for the training of farm workers and agricultural stations here.

Viscount Willingdon, the Governor-General, expresses in a foreword his belief that a fresh era has now begun in Canadian development, and the Prime Minister, Mr. Mackenzie King, in a special message, predicts the rise of "an even greater Canada." Reading the articles contained in this Number (which runs to over 200 pages, and is published at 2- or 50 cents), one realises how well-founded are these views. The Canadian National Exhibition, that highly important factor in the life of the Dominion, is dealt with in a separate section. Then follow sections devoted to each of the nine Provinces, arranged in geographical order from East to West. Messages and articles by the Lieutenant-Governors, the Premiers and other Ministers give these pages an unquestionably authoritative character. Practically all the messages and special articles in the issue are autographed and accompanied by photos of the writers.

SNOW IN NORTH ALBERTA DELAYS SPRING SEEDING EDMONTON, Alta., May 7.—Considerable delay in spring seeding operations is expected to result from the heavy snowfall which hit the Edmonton district yesterday morning. About three inches of heavy wet snow fell, and it will require several days of warm weather to dry out the ground sufficiently to permit resumption of seeding operations. More details of damage wrought by the storm were learned this afternoon. Hundreds of telephone poles between Edmonton and Ponoka were snapped off and thrown across the highway.

WHAT'S NEW FOR THE GARDEN Seed catalogues are now in the hands of gardeners and a study of the new developments in vegetables for 1928 offers a distraction from the entertainment flowing in from all quarters by radio. The number of novelties and specialties shows a complete recovery from the wartime cessation in the development of new plants checked for several years as it requires five or six years to fix a new type of plant so that it may be depended upon to come true from seed. There are new lima beans, new peas, new beets, new tomatoes, new sweet corn, in fact, a general development of "vegetables" all along the line, most of them in the way of improving existing varieties in the way of earliness and increasing bearing. Every gardener should try a few novelties in an effort to improve his garden. He should not depend entirely on new things as it is safer to depend upon varieties known to be reliable and successful in his section until the new things are tried out. But something should be tried and if it proves better than the old-timers they should be supplanted. The trying out of new plants is one of the most interesting phases of gardening both in the vegetable and flower garden. In the vegetable lines there isn't much in the way of new vegetables to be expected as the temperate zone has been thoroughly explored for its edibles for many years. The development is in the way of improving those that we already have and the progress has been remarkable.
