ASK POWERS FOR PEACE IN BALKANS

PARIS, March 2. - The French parliamentary arbitration group of which Baron D'Estournelles de Constant is president, to-day undertook an effort to arouse the public opinion of the world and to compel the powers to offer mediation in event that a conflict in the Balkans becomes inevitable.

The Hague convention "can never be considered an unfriendly act by litigants." The support of the United States and of the South American republics is especially desired by the French group, and telegraphic appeals will be despatched to Washington and the South American capitals requesting co-operation.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT

DISCIPLINE

"Any violation of the Rules of the Association shall render a Club or individual liable to suspension by the Executive Committee until the next meeting of the Association (unless previously revoked), and expulsion by a two-thirds vote of the Clubs represented at such meeting.

"Should the President be unable from any cause to get a quorum of the Committee, he shall have the power, should he consider the evidence sufficient, to suspend the club or individual, until his or its case shall have been decided as provided by the bye-laws.

"All sentences of disqualification and suspension by any club in the Association shall be binding on all the clubs who form the Association, but an appeal against the sentence may be sent to the Secretary of the Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association within ten days of the date of the imposition; and such appeal (as provided for by Bye-law 5) at a meeting to be specially summoned at the earliest possible date, but shall not be considered if the sentence has been carried out.

"In the event of any application for re-instatement as an amateur athlete, it shall be the duty of the President to appoint a sub-committee of three to investigate the case. This committee, who shall meet within ten days to the President, who shall immediately notify the athlete in question of the ruling of the Committee. Said athlete shall have the right of appeal from the decision, either to the Executive or to the Annual Meeting. Such appeal must be filed with the Secretary within twenty days of the finding of the committee, and until it shall be ruled on either by the Executive or the Annual Meeting, such judgment shall stand."

"The next move was a delegation to Halifax. This was announced in the Press, subsequently denied in the case of one of the parties stating that he had gone to Truro on business. However, his return has proved conclusively that his business must have been extended to Halifax. It would also be interesting to the public to get a report of that meeting of the citizens at which he was requested to go and in whose interests he acted. That they did represent the Victorias, the Abegweits are not denying, but they claim that these gentlemen are certainly not setting an example for consistency; so thoroughly did they disapprove of the action of the Victorias that on the night of the dispute both resigned from the Club. Next behold them in Halifax pleading for these gentlemen. Following this memorable visit, J. C. Lithgow, President of the M. P. A. A., wired a ruling to the Secretary of the Hockey League to which the Abbies paid no heed. And the Abegweits would here state that Mr. Lithgow ruled after having heard only one side of the story, showing clearly that he had no intention of trying to be fair. This gentleman has on other occasions attempted to make rulings that have been afterwards resented by the Association. He totally ignores Constitution and Bye-laws and tries to take upon himself the powers of other officials. In fact he tries to be President, Secretary, Investigating Committee and the whole Executive. The force created by his individual action in connection with the St. John Firemen's Tournament a little over a year ago is well remembered in the Province; his muddled performances in connection with Fredericton Hockey matters is also recent history. In fact, dissatisfaction is reigning and has reigned in the Association for some time past. Only a year or two ago Cape Breton broke away from its jurisdiction and affiliated direct with the C. A. A. U., and the fact that the whole Province of New Brunswick has only one or two clubs affiliated with it is sufficient to show the wide-spread discontent.

The Opposition not only asked unreasonable questions, but misleading questions. He read from May that the Government were not required to answer questions which were not in the public interest. In declining to answer, the Government took the full responsibility. Full details of receipts and outlays down to 31st January instead of 1st January had been given. This was fair and not misleading. They were prepared to give account of receipts and outlays down to date. When the proper time came he would give a full account of the road money and what the country got for it. In many cases they had work done by the day. All Governments had done the same. There was a bridge near Souris twice offered for competition and afterwards built by day's work for half the amount of the lowest bids.

MR. MCLEAN hoped the Commissioner would not be led astray by reading what "ministers" could do. He argued that the returns asked for were necessary for comparison with previous years. They wanted to know how the country stands. Not a school district would vote money for the next year till they knew what had been done this year. What had been asked for was information that had always been tabled in past years—returns to the 31st December. They would be satisfied with nothing less.

FRANK HASZARD nominated MR. PROWSE to fill the vacancy on the Public Accounts committee.

MR. PROWSE objected that he was not feeling very well and Mr. McKinnon was appointed in his stead.

MR. PALMER was selected to take the place of Mr. Agnew on the Encroaching Committee.

At 6 o'clock the House adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

GOVERNMENT PLAN OF PENSIONS

Considerable interest is manifested in the system recently put in operation by the Dominion Government by which any man, woman, or child may secure an annuity or pension act after attaining a certain age. Hand-bills in connection with the scheme have been posted up in the Post Office corridor and booklets containing full information can be obtained from the Postmaster. The scheme presents an exceptional opportunity for any person to make provision for his old age. No person is debarred from its benefit, male or female. No medical examination is required. A person may contract for an annuity at the age of five or any subsequent age, but except for invalidity or disability no annuity shall be payable before the age of fifty five. Payments may be made monthly, quarterly, half yearly or yearly by regular or irregular payments, or in a lump sum. The annuity will depend altogether on the amount paid in.

There are no lapses and no charge of any kind is made, all expenses being borne by the Government. Then again a person cannot be deprived of an annuity in any manner by any person or any process of law. A man may provide annuities for himself, his wife or his children. He may provide for joint annuity for himself and wife. An immediate annuity may be purchased and the first instalment received three months after purchase. In case of death before the annuity becomes payable all payments made with interest at three per cent compounded will be returned to the heirs.

Here are some figures showing the benefits of the scheme:—For twenty-five cents per week paid from age of twenty to sixty an annuity of \$129.19 may be obtained to commence at latter age. By an annual payment of \$10.01 a man commencing at twenty may secure an annuity of one hundred, at sixty, with return of all payments with three per cent compound interest in case of death before sixty. For a single payment of one hundred dollars at the age of twenty an annuity of \$32.04 would be paid to begin at sixty and in case of death before sixty the payment made with three per cent compound interest would be returned to the heirs.

GERMANY HOPES FOR PEACE

BERLIN, Feb. - The Foreign Office has not yet received any word from St. Petersburg or Belgrade that the Russian Government has declared that Serbia cannot hope for support from Russia in the event of an outbreak of hostilities between Austria-Hungary and Serbia.

Serbian students in the Polytechnic School at Cothen have received telegraphic orders to join the colors, and it is reported that many Austrian students in Germany are home-bound in the expectation of war. The best official opinion here, however, continues confident that there will be no war between Austria-Hungary and Serbia.

Princess Edith of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, who is expected to visit the United States, will be accompanied by her husband, Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany.

The Government has decided to send a large contingent of troops to the Mediterranean coast to guard against any possible invasion from the east.

The British fleet has been ordered to maintain a strong presence in the North Atlantic to deter any possible aggression from the United States.

The French Government has announced that it will continue to support the Serbian cause in the Balkan conflict.

The Russian Government has expressed its willingness to negotiate a peace settlement if the other belligerents are ready to do so.

The United States has reiterated its policy of neutrality in the current European conflict.

The German Government has announced that it will continue to support the Austro-Hungarian cause in the Balkan conflict.

The British Government has announced that it will continue to support the Serbian cause in the Balkan conflict.

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
