The Grand Lodge I. O. G. T., at Moncton has passed a resolution recommending that the question of provincial prohibition be before the next session of the legislature, submitted to a vote of the electorate with the distinct understanding that if the majority of those polling decided in favor of prohibition, the provincial government shall introduce at the next session of the legislature as a government measure an act to carry into effect the will of the people as expressed at the polls, said act to be along lines similar to that of the P. E. Island prohibition act.

Also that no compromise measure be accepted. The Grand Lodge favored extension of political equality to women as one of the best means of maintaining prohibition and otherwise uplifting and purifying the political and social life of the country.

Maritime provincialists to the number of about 100, gathered together in the Pythian hall, at Edmonton recently for the purpose of organizing an association of the sons and daughters from the provinces down where the Atlantic beats upon the shores of Canada. 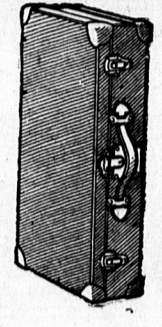

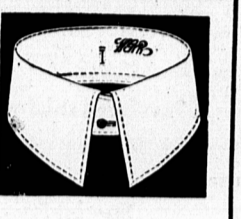
