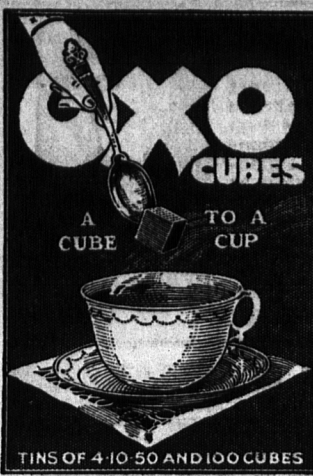

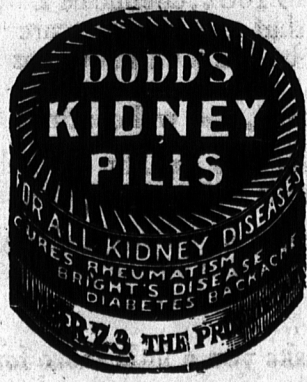

HUN U-BOATS ON THIS SIDE OF ATLANTIC?

BOSTON, Nov. 30.—Shipping circles reported tonight that radio messages warning allied shipping to avoid the regular steamship lanes because of the reported presence of German submarines on this side of the Atlantic, had been sent out today, at last one every four hours. The warnings are believed to have come from allied cruisers patrolling the coast and the British government stations at Bermuda and Halifax.

CANNOT LEAVE THE UNITED KINGDOM WITHOUT SPECIAL PERMIT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—No one henceforth will be allowed to go from the United Kingdom to Spain, Portugal or South America without special permit, according to an announcement of the British Foreign Office, made public today through the state department. The telegram from the American Embassy in London, dated Nov. 28, reads as follows: "Foreign office informs me that after December 1st, with certain exceptions, no persons will be allowed to proceed from the United Kingdom to

Spain, Portugal or South America, either direct by sea or via France, without first having obtained permits. Applications must be made in person either in London or Liverpool."
