The Town Council is at present considering the request of the truckmen for a raise in the truckage rates. As all are probably aware, our truckmen are licensed and their rates for hauling in different parts of the town are controlled and regulated by the Town Fathers. Since the organization of the laborers of the town, demands for better wages have been frequently made and with satisfactory results, so that today the laborer is better paid than in former years. On the other hand it must be remembered that the cost of living has gone up; the prices on the necessities of life have advanced, which has formed the chief argument in the demand for higher wages. It is probable that the Council will grant the request made by the truckman. But where does the town come in for a share in these advances in the price of labor and the goods of this world? Shall the truckmen's license fee remain the same as it is? The laboring man's tax, like every other man's tax, has not been changed; nor has the town in any way found in these advances any more revenue than it did when material and wages were at a lower figure. We assume that the resources for revenue are limited, while the necessary expenditures are on the increase. Does it not occur then to the wide-awake citizen that something should be done in order to meet these ever increasing liabilities? Would not the truckmen be willing, if their rates are raised, to contribute a little more for their license. If the truckman can make from 25 cents to \$1 per day more for his work, should he not feel disposed to pay say one dollar per year more for his license. And the same argument applies to all other classes of citizens. While the cost of living is getting greater it must ever be borne in mind that the cost of keeping up the town as a matter of course is also on the increase. Most of us are afraid of taxation; and the man who dares even suggest a raising of the taxes would find in a moment that he had many enemies. But this should not be. If we are to have a well kept town, if we are to compete with other towns in catering to the motley stranger. If we are to enjoy the comforts of life as a people—as people in other towns do—we must expect to pay for these. We have all the conveniences we require, some will say. This may be true with some people.

There are those who are content with little; there are those who would as soon that we did not have any sidewalks; but these do not form the ruling majority of our citizens—at least it is to be hoped that they do not. However the matter stands, thus: expenditure is on the increase; revenue is limited. This is not written with any spirit of objection to the demands of the truckmen; but these demands, while on the increase, suggest a partial remedy for raising our small revenue, and it is in a greater light that the need of taking some steps to prevent the town going backward in this progressive age.

between us in connection with this matter it has only been with regard to the practicability of the proposal which would seem to require on the part of the colonies a limitation in the all round development of a protective policy, and on the part of this country the establishment of a preference in favor of important colonial products. On the first of these requirements I say nothing; but if the second involves, as it most certainly does, taxation wherever light upon food stuffs, I am convinced with you that public opinion is not yet ripe for such an arrangement. The reasons may easily be found in past political battles and present political misrepresentation. If then this branch of fiscal reform is not at present within the limits of practical politics, you are surely right in your advice not to treat it as indissolubly connected with that other branch of fiscal reform to which we both attach importance and which we believe the country is prepared to consider without prejudice.

"I feel, however, deeply concerned that you should regard this conclusion, however well founded, as one making it difficult in your very special circumstances for you to remain a member of the Government. Yet, I do not venture in a matter so strictly personal, to raise any objection if you think you can best serve the interests of imperial unity, for which you have done so much by pressing your views on colonial preference, with the freedom which is possible in an independent position, but hardly compatible with office. "How can I criticize your determination? The loss to the government is great indeed, but the gain to the cause you have at heart may be greater still. If so what can I do but acquiesce?"
