The citizens meeting, Summerside, last night was large and satisfactory. Mayor Compton suggested the appointment of a chairman in order to give both Mayor and councillors an opportunity to make any explanation that might be necessary. A motion was introduced, to appoint a committee of five business men to a sub-committee of the town council in reorganization and thorough equipment of the fire department. The following committee was appointed: William Stewart, H. T. Holman, J. M. Clark, E. J. Wyatt, and T. B. Grady. J. A. Brace advocated a system of water works and sewerage. His remarks favoring waterworks were loudly applauded. He moved a resolution that it is advisable that action be taken within 30 days for the election of three water commissioners under the Summerside Water and Sewerage Act of 1905. The motion was unanimous. John M. Clark followed with a telling address on municipal ownership. He moved a resolution that it is advisable that the town acquire and operate an electric light system in connection with a waterworks and sewerage system. Neill McLeod followed in support of the motion. The motion was also unanimous. William Stewart suggested that the remuneration here-tofore given the firemen should be increased. He moved a vote of thanks to the individual firemen and others. This was unanimously carried. On motion of J. J. Wyatt, a vote of thanks was tendered to the Mayor of Charlottetown for the ready response given to the call of the town for help, also the individual firemen who came from Charlottetown for the splendid work done by them while here. After a vote of thanks to the chairman the meeting was brought to a close.
