While there is no reason to expect the Directors of Famous Players Canadian Corporation to issue a statement covering the earnings of the company for the six months of the current fiscal year, September 1 to February 28, it is general knowledge that these earnings would show a very marked increase of the corresponding period of last year.

This will mean that the dividend would have been earned over four times during the year—that is, practically once every quarter. While the directors have been pursuing a very conservative course in regard to dividends and making heavy write-offs against the new equipment that has to a considerable extent revolutionized the movie business today, we understand that serious consideration will be given this year to an increase in the prevailing dividend.

The financial statement of National Breweries for the year 1929 is being awaited with keen interest because it is anticipated that the report will show not only a substantial improvement in earning power such as the public have been accustomed to look for year after year, but also the annual improvement that has been manifest in the balance sheet.

While the past year's report is likely to be all that is expected, a rather unusual indication has been given that this record will be broken in 1930, for both in January and February, ordinary quiet months, good gains have been registered in sales over the same period in 1929, the gain for February being double that of January on a percentage standpoint.
