JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Feb. 27 (CP)—The longest quiete ever lined up here formed today when chewing gum went on sale for the first time in two years, with each person rationed to two sticks.

Potato Shippers Resent Action

WOODSTOCK, Feb. 26 — Local potato shippers are highly indignant over the action taken to import two million pounds of potatoes from Maine into the Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton markets. They point out that New Brunswick still has plenty of potatoes but lack of refrigerator cars has prohibited movement. How the Maine shippers could find 200 or 300 cars in preference to here is not explained. Another disquieting item is the announcement that the U. S. government plans to dispose of millions of bushels of last year's crop chiefly by shipment to Canada. Weather conditions are good for movement of the crop here, it is pointed out, and the farmers are anxious to sell but equipment cannot be obtained.

H. G. Crawford Now Dom. Entomologist

H. G. Crawford, M. Sc. B.S.A., has been appointed Dominion Entomologist in succession to the late Dr. L. S. McLaine. Mr. Crawford is a Master of Science of the University of Illinois a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture of the Ontario Agricultural College, and studied at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and Dalhousie University. He first joined the Entomological Division Branch as it was then known, of the Dominion Department of Agriculture in 1916 and in 1917, and in the following year appointed lecturer on the Entomological Staff of the Ontario Agricultural College. In 1920 he returned to



Clarence (Windy) Steele of Summerside, now a supervisor with the Knights of Columbus War Services, overseas and formerly a well-known hockey player.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture and in 1925 was promoted Chief, Division of Field Crop and Garden Insect Investigations, a position he held until his recent promotion.

Mr. Crawford is a member of the American Association of Economic Entomologists, the Canadian Society of Technical Agriculturists, the Entomological Society of Ontario, the Quebec Society for the Protection of Plants, the Ottawa Field-Naturalists Club, and the Professional Institute of the Civil Service of Canada. During his association with these technical societies, he has been President of the Entomological Society of Ontario, the Ottawa Field-Naturalists Club, and Honorary Secretary of the Canadian Society of Technical Agriculturists for several years.

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching last evening on the text "The sea is His, and He made it" (Psalm 95:5) the Minister, the Rev. T. H. Russell Somers, said: "There is one other message of the sea which it is fitting we should mention here. It is that it has helped to keep alive in every age the sense of the grandeur and the majesty of God. It has sometimes been charged against our Christian faith that it dims the thoughts of the majesty of God. We do not address Him as the great Creator; we address Him as our Father. We take the most intimate of all relationships, with the beautiful sunshine of the home upon it. And we use that of God. Have you not sometimes felt in the prayers of some people an over-familiarity with God? Have you never been conscious in your own prayers that the thought of the awfulness of God was lacking? And whenever we are tempted to forget that, in the hurry and fever of activity, God provides us with two mighty spectacles which silently bring it to the heart again. The one is the sky, the silent, starry sky. The other is the sea. The one is far away and unaccessible. The other is washing at our feet. Yet both are so vast; that they suggest infinity, so filled with power that we feel our helplessness. So still sometimes upon a summer evening that for us beyond these voices there is peace. I turn to the myriads of snowflakes each exquisitely patterned and they speak to me of the matchless providence of God. I turn to the meadow, under the arching trees, and it whispers to my heart that God is love. I turn to the ocean with its infinite distances, within whose depths are held a million secrets, and I feel that He whom we know in Christ is sovereign, and of majestic unsearchable. You must never lose that sense in any contest. Amid all the pressure of life you must sustain it. It tranquillizes; allays the fret and fever; brings the angel-faces back again.
