CHARLES BATT, while working yesterday on the tug F. M. Batt, in attempting to jack up a bar, was badly out on the cheek by the bar which slipped and struck him with great force.

The case against Ernest W. Irving for obtaining goods under false pretences came up yesterday forenoon at the Police Court and resulted in his honorable discharge. P. J. Trainor of McDonald & Trainor appeared for Irving.

At the Police Court yesterday the Prohibition cases against Francis Collins, Daniel MacMillan, Augustus Elsworth, Elizabeth McMillan and Benj. McMillan were further adjourned a week for missing witnesses. Edward Hennessy was fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness.

Terence took place on Sunday night of Mrs. Davies, widow of the late Simon Davies of this city. Mrs. Davies had for a number of years been an invalid but was ever resigned to the Divine Will. She leaves to mourn four sons, Fred, Arthur and Cecil residing abroad and Jack in this city to whom the sympathy of many friends will be extended.

Rev. A. F. Browne of North River, and Rev. G. R. White of Charlottetown will exchange pulpits on Sunday evening, May 15th.

NINE persons were received into the fellowship of the Prince Street Baptist church last Sunday evening, by pastor White.

The Guardian regrets to learn from a telegram received by Jos McCarey yesterday that Dr. Wickham who has been at the Sanitarium at St. Agathe, Quebec for the past five weeks is sinking rapidly.

The Campana arrived in port on her first trip of the season yesterday forenoon at 9.30 bringing from Montreal a general cargo of merchandise. She sailed again last night with a large outward cargo including 1500 packages of potatoes, oats and eggs.

The Richmond Record says:—The schooner Spring Bird arrived at Arichat from Halifax on Friday with large consignments of freight, some of which, it is reported, was shipped several weeks ago, and the delay in receiving the goods was a loss to the merchants. The vessel is owned in P. E. Island.

Mrs. A. A. Ryan of Fitzroy Street has shown The Guardian a remarkably well preserved Spanish silver dollar bearing date 110 years ago. The inscription on one side is: Carlos III, Dei Gratia, 1794. On the reverse side: Hispan, et Ind. Rex. M. & R. F. M. Mrs. Ryan says her husband the late Conductor Ryan of the P. E. Island Railway, received the coin from a Newfoundland sailor in payment for his passage.

WHILE shunting last night about ten o'clock a freight car was derailed just outside the railway station. It was soon placed on the track again without damage. In the meantime a message had been sent to Royalty Junction to the incoming express to let the passengers disembark at the pork factory and this order was not cancelled before the train passed the Junction. When the express reached the station there were few passengers on board as nearly all had left the train. Many thus missed their friends and carriages which were in waiting.

MECHANICAL Superintendent Poole, of the P. E. I. Railway left yesterday for Pictou to bring over four new locomotives, one car of iron bridges, and three cars of rails, the latter for the Hillsborough Bridge. There were five new locomotives recently built by the Kingston Locomotive Works for the P. E. I. Railway, one of which is now on exhibition at the St. Louis Fair, and will be delivered on the Island after the close of the Exposition. Chief Superintendent Sharp has secured the steamer Mulgrave and her crew to bring the whole lot over from Pictou.

It was noted some time ago that F. W. Hyndman, of this city, had been awarded the Canada General Service Medal for his services in Her Majesty's ship Dunca at the time of the Fenian raid in 1866. The Guardian reporter called upon Mr. Hyndman yesterday and was shown the medal which is issued from the Royal Mint. On one side is the bust of her late Majesty, and around the margin the words "Victoria Regina et Imperatrix." On the reverse side is the Canadian flag surrounded by a wreath of maple leaves and round the edge is Mr. Hyndman's name, rank and ship then serving in. On the clasp are the words "Fenian Raid 1866." The ribbon is red, white, red. It is believed this is the only medal of the kind held in this Province and probably in Canada, being for naval services. Mr. Hyndman entered the service in 1858 and retired in 1870 under the Childer's scheme of retirement. During his term of service Mr. Hyndman took part in many events which are now considered of great historic interest including the visit of the present King to Canada, the laying of the Newfoundland, Atlantic and Malta to Alexandria cables. Mr. Hyndman was present at the suppression of the Jamaica Rebellion in 1865 and afterwards at the driving off of the raiders and suppression of the Fenian Raid on the borders of New Brunswick in 1866 for which the medal has been awarded. He was also present at the formal opening ceremony of the Suez Canal and accompanied the fleet with Her Majesty the Empress Eugenie through to Suez in 1869. He was afterwards employed with Sir George Nares in making a complete survey of that canal from Port Said to Suez, and had the distinction of paying in his official capacity the first toll levied in that great highway to the East. Since retirement Mr. Hyndman has resided in Charlottetown.

- An assorted range of various patterns in good quality print, nicely made in latest style and fitting accurately is .72cts
- A very dainty and attractive line is of fancy striped pique, white and black, with tucks and tab collar; finished and cut as carefully as the more expensive lines. price \$1.25
- Returning to the more expensive lines.
