Allies Must Take Action In

PARIS, April 3.—With the publication of the statement to the effect that the British and French Governments are agreed that the future Russian Government of whatever kind must be, must honor the obligations contracted by its predecessor, the Temps this evening again calls attention to the urgent need for the Allies to agree upon what action to take in Russia beginning tomorrow.
