son & Co., London, England, January raw fur sales, show an advance on practically all kinds of Canadian Furs over prices realized in the March sales of last year, in considering the report of the London Sales, the reader will remember that the prices realized at the March Sales were extremely low and Canadian dealers have already anticipated the advance and are paying prices about equal to those obtained at the London Sales.

London Sale prices are as follows: Wolf 75, Bear 25, Marten 25, Mink 10, Beaver 35, Lynx 30, Muskrat 60, Fisher 100, Red Fox 40 and Wild Cat 40 p. c. higher than in the March Sales. White Weasel 10 per cent lower than March. Other brought the same price as in the March Sales.

Our Mr. Haslam, attended the New York Auction Sales of raw furs last week and reports that while some goods sold at high prices, other lines were a disappointment, and the average prices the furs brought, were no higher than is now being paid by Canadian dealers, when the reader studies this express on furs to New York and the 5 per cent commission that was charged for selling the furs. There was a good representation of dealers present and upwards of \$100,000.00 worth of furs were sold, taken on the whole it was a very successful sale.

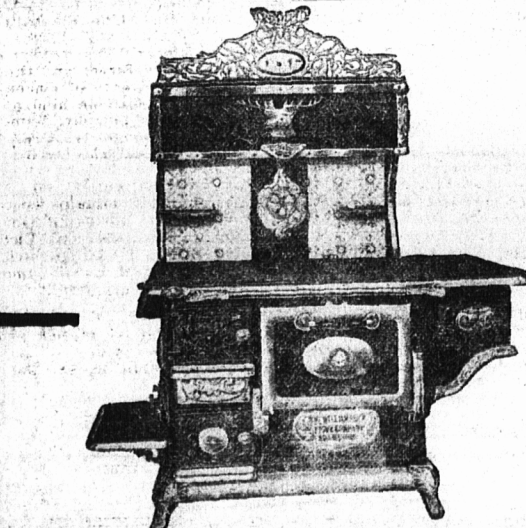
