Annual Report C. W. L. Activities

1939-40 Madam President, Your Excellency, Rev. Chaplain, Officers and members of the Charlottetown Sub-division, Catholic Women's League. As your recording Secretary for the past year, I beg to report as follows: During the year ten monthly, eight executive and two special meetings were held. These meetings which were very well attended have been most interesting and enjoyable by our convenor of programme, Miss Hilda Gillis who provided musical numbers of a high order and interesting speakers and to all those who were deeply grateful. In June we had the happy privilege of joining in the welcome to their Majesties King George and Queen Elizabeth on the occasion of their visit to our province. As a National organization our sentiments of loyalty and welcome were presented in a tangible form by forwarding a resolution which was designed by the Sisters of the Monastery to them from our Sub-division. Thanks was conveyed to the sub-division from his Majesty's Private Secretary. Our Hospital Bazaar was held in June and as usual we sent a donation. This year it was a quilt made by one of the study group, during the winter months. This was lotteried and added a considerable to the funds. In August the Diocesan Convention was held at Notre Dame Academy our sub-division was hostess and our President was voted delegate and she brought a full report of the Convention to the September meeting. A great many of our members were able to attend and we all feel indebted to the good Sisters for the privileges accorded us during the Convention. In September our hearts were saddened by the news of the outbreak of war in Europe, and we all realize that when Great Britain is at war Canada is at war. Our members as all members of National Organizations are looked to at times like these to take the lead in all patriotic endeavours. Accordingly our members were asked to assist in a voluntary enlistment of all Catholic Women who were willing to join in the ranks of service according to their ability. This was done in compliance with a resolution passed at the National C. W. L. Convention held in Winnipeg in June. This work met with the approval of our clergy. On invitation a great many of our members attended a meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Society and offered to work along the lines laid out by this organization knitting and sewing for war work was taken up in the different study groups and the Convenor of this committee will give detailed account of what has been accomplished in the eleven study clubs. Another branch of war work undertaken by our sub-division and very capably handled by our efficient Corresponding Secretary is the renailing of reading matter to our soldiers overseas. Representatives of our organization were also requested to attend a meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Society at the Charlottetown Hotel September 26, two members were present and subscribed to a \$5.00 bond. The report of the Aged and Infirm committee, Mrs. W. O. Davey, Convenor is a very creditable one and centres round the Christmas charity dispensed, when the Convenor and some more of the members met and prepared 165 packages for the Provincial Infirmary as well as boxes for the Sacred Heart Home inmates, the Sisters of the Precious Blood and Social Service. These were supplied by donations from members and some of our business men to all of whom C. W. L. extends thanks. Religious articles were supplied at the Infirmary to all those who needed them. The Convenor of Social Service, Mrs. P. J. Ready reports the work carried on as usual. The proceeds of the picture sponsored by the sub-division for which approximately 1000 tickets were sold was given over to the Social Service and with other small donations amount to \$165.00. Members also meet each week to sew for this worthy cause at the City Hospital. 272 articles have been made and 550 donated and 80 magazines have been distributed making a total of 822. Besides these a great many other necessary things were gathered up and given directly to those in great need. The Convenor of Education Committee, Mrs. Paquette reports the usual progress made to educational institutions and the collegiate club is carrying on as in other years. This club fills a much needed place in the entertainment not only of our students but all Catholic Students of the Diocese attending the various colleges. The social affairs have been well attended during the year. Besides the Conventions report will give full details. The convenor of Book Review, Mrs. P. W. Clarkin has reported that new books have been received at the library and added to the lists of books for good reading to be found in the Basilica and Holy Redeemer churches. There is also a list of these books in the library and copies are being made for the country churches, copies of this list have been requested by other organizations. It is encouraging to learn that these lists which are intended to safeguard faith and morals are being frequently used. The subscribers to the Canadian League are kept in touch with the latest publications through Miss Tansy while in the crusade against immoral magazines the latest report from the President is that after taking up the matter of the petition presented at last session of Legislature with the Attorney General, his reply was that owing to frequent changes in the personnel of the R. C. M. P. who are supposed to carry out the law in regard to the banned magazines the matter had not received the continued attention which it deserved. He said he had instructed the R. C. M. P. to report progress to him. We are awaiting this report before doing anything further in the matter. The Convenor of Press-Mrs. T. E. Corrigan has attended to the reporting of our monthly meetings faithfully. While the Citizenship Convenor-Mrs. I. E. Croken reports that we have taken an active part in Civic and Patriotic affairs such as helping the Red Cross in their collection for war work, assisting the T. B. League by purchasing a \$5.00 bond; also helping in collecting for the Boy Scout Campaign. We have representatives

The thanks of the sub-division is extended to His Excellency the Bishop, the clergy especially our Chaplain Father Keefe for assistance and encouragement at all times. Also our thanks to the kind Sisters of the City Hospital for the use of the Nurse's Home for our afternoon tea; also thanks to the management of the Prince Edward Theatre for the use of the Patriotic and Guardian for courtesies extended and publicity given to our activities. I think you will all agree with me that this has been a successful year for our sub-division and while we may not have reached all our goals, yet we feel sure we have accomplished much for the glory of God and the good of Canada.
