NOT EXPECT SECRETARY OF STATE CORDELL HULL to come to the conference but said Mr. Hull was in constant telephone communication with the president.

THE OFFICIAL British spokesman at the press conference stressed that Mr. Eden was coming only for general talks with his chief and not necessarily to participate in the conference proper.

BUT OBSERVERS here felt it would need to be something very pressing to bring the foreign secretary across the Atlantic only a day or two before the Quebec conference is due to end.

A POSSIBLE explanation, assuming that Mr. Eden was not coming for conference purposes, would be that Mr. Churchill contemplates a further travel before returning home and wanted to talk to his foreign secretary before going on to some less accessible place.

LONGEST BRITISH PARLIAMENT SINCE CROMWELL'S TIME

LONDON, Sept. 14 (CP Cable) - A bill adding a 10th year to this longest of modern parliaments will be introduced when the House of Commons assembles Sept. 26 after the summer recess.

Not since Cromwell's time has parliament had so long a life but the feeling in Britain is that it will be cut short before its 10th year is completed.

Normal life of parliament is five years and the life of the present House expired in November, 1940. Since then, bills extending it another 12 months have been passed annually.

More permanent redistribution of seats before the election and many service voters still are unregistered. It is also planned to carry out interim redistribution of seats before the election.

This legislation will create 25 temporary constituencies, giving the House 640 members instead of the present 615. The London area constituencies of Romford and Hendon will be split into four seats and Harrow into three.

Prime Minister Churchill's riding, is among those to be split.
