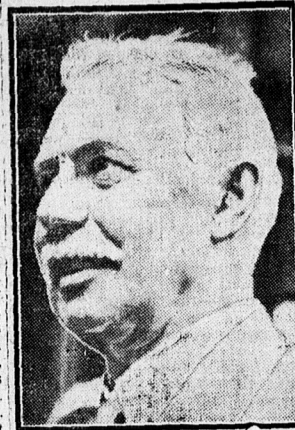

MODERATOR OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO VISIT PROVINCE

Rt. Rev. Dr. Leslie Clay of Victoria, B.C., the Distinguished Island Ecclesiastic Will hold service at Charlottetown, Summerside and Malpeque on Sunday first.

Intimation has been received from the Rt. Rev. Dr. Leslie Clay, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, that he will visit the Province over the week-end enroute to St. John, N. B., to attend the Maritime Synod. Rev. Dr. Clay, as is well known is one of the most distinguished Island ecclesiastics in Canada today. He is a native of Bedouque and was educated at Summerside, and Prince of Wales College before entering upon his university career. He has for the long period of nearly thirty years occupied the pulpit of the leading Church in British Columbia, that of St. Andrew's, Victoria, and for the most of that period has taken a prominent part in the activities of the various Courts of the Church. He is a forcible and eloquent preacher. He is a frequent guest of the various great congregations wherever he is booked to preach. On Sunday he will occupy St. James Church, Charlottetown at 11 a. m., Malpeque at 3 p. m., and S'ide at 7 p. m.

HOUSEHOLD SCRAP BOOK

To Keep Food Hot

Cover securely with the lid of a tin pan and place the vessel over a basin of hot water. When vegetables are cooked, drain and cover securely, then wrap well in paper and set in oven without fire. They will keep steaming hot for a long time.

Curing Feathers

Dissolve equal pounds of quicklime to the same number of gallons of water. Let it settle well and pour off the liquid. Soak feathers in this solution for 4 or 5 days and then rinse in several changes of water and dry.

Weak Or Tired Eyes

Mix a solution of salt water, as hot as can be borne. Wring a clean cloth in this solution and hold it over the eyes. Repeat when the cloth is cool.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN T. CROCKETT

In the passing of Mr. John T. Crockett, Charlottetown has lost one of its best-known and much respected citizens. For a number of years it was evident that his health was gradually declining and about three weeks ago his condition became so serious as to indicate that the end was near, and yesterday morning at seven o'clock his spirit passed to Him who gave it.

The late Mr. Crockett was born in Charlottetown on February 2nd, 1851, and at the time of his demise had reached the advanced age of nearly 77 years. In his boyhood he entered the employ of the then large shipping, and ship-building firm of Messrs. Peake Bros. and Company, in this city. Subsequently he was associated with the late Mr. J. H. Myrick who carried on extensive fisheries in the Province, and whose stores were located at Charlottetown and Tignish. For a life-time Mr. Crockett carried on the fish and grocery business, his store, situated on Grafton Street West being the fish emporium of the city.

On the death of Mr. Myrick, which occurred many years ago, Mr. Crockett took over the business, and up to the present he had conducted it on his own account. It was one of the largest fish and grocery concerns in the Island, and for upwards of half a century this business was recognized as one of the standard concerns of the Province. In his younger life Mr. Crockett was an active member of the social and commercial life of this community. He was enterprising and always had in view the progress of the city and Province and the general welfare of the people. He was a member of St. Peter's Church, and also belonged to the Masonic body here; and frequently during the absence of the American Consul, for he was Vice-Consul at this port for years. He was also a staunch Liberal, who never wavered in his political beliefs.

Thus one by one our older business men who were looked upon as the pillars of the commercial life of the City in the past, are joining the

great majority, and thus the round of life goes on indefinitely. They have done their part and they have left an imprint of progress as they pass on. Owing to his falling health, Mr. Crockett of late years had taken little part in public or business affairs. He is gone to that bourne from which no traveller has ever returned.

There are left to mourn their loss, and cherish his memory, his wife, and two daughters, Mrs. M. M. Clements, of Malden, Mass., and Mrs. Norman McLeod of this City; also four sons, Harry, Ernest, and Leslie, in Charlottetown, and Percy of Norristown, Penn.

The funeral will take place this afternoon.

To the sorrowing relatives is extended heartfelt sympathy.

Livestock Report

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—Fresh receipts of livestock on the two markets today amounted to 168 cattle, 123 lambs, 1543 hogs and 89 calves. Trading was dragsy as the heavy run of yesterday enabled buyers to supply the bulk of their immediate requirements and their sales were slow today. The cattle sales were common quality and light common bulls sold \$3.25 to \$3.75. Canners \$1.75 to \$2.75. There were no good veal calves. A couple of small lots common ones were sold for \$9.00 and \$10.50 and grass calves brought \$5.00 to \$6.00. There were no good lambs. A few small lots of common ones were quoted from \$9.00 to \$10.00 and \$10.50 was the ruling quotation for good quality ewes and wethers. Hogs were lower. Packers paid \$10.50 for thick smooths, \$1 per hog bonus on selects and \$1.50 per hog discount on shops and \$2 per hog discount on heavies. Sows sold from \$7.50 to \$8.50. Bulk of sales close to \$8.00.
