At Dundas, P. E. I., Aug. 20th, John T. Wood, aged sixty-four years, passed to his eternal reward. He was an outstanding citizen of that community and his going will be felt by a host of friends. He was a loyal and faithful member of the Baptist Church and the church feels keenly their loss. In his quiet unassuming way he was a friend that never failed in time of need. To be ranked among his friends was a privilege and an honor.

TEACHER TRAINING—The first meeting of the Mount Stewart Teachers' Training School took place in Mount Stewart School, Tuesday evening, October 15th, with an attendance of twelve teachers. The meeting was opened by Mr. Howard Court, Supervisor of Schools. The following officers were then elected: President, Miss Bessie McLeod; Secretary, Miss Annie McDonald; Press Committee, Miss Annie Donnelly and Miss Mary McDonald; Programme Committee, Miss Florence McDougald and Miss Mary Donnelly. The President then called upon Mr. Court, who spoke for a brief period on the necessity of such meetings to the teaching profession in a province where the Teachers' Training Course is so limited. Mr. Court then gave a very interesting and instructive demonstration on the use of the sand table in teaching geography, history and literature. He is hopeful that in the near future a sand table will be installed in each school in his inspectorate. The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 12th. At this meeting Oral Reading will be discussed. There will also be a Question Box. Each teacher will ask at least one question, preferably on the subject discussed at Training School, (Patriot please copy).

THE MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION—The P. E. Island Ministerial Association met in St. Paul's Parish Hall, Charlottetown, on Thursday, Oct. 10th, at 2 p. m. Rev. H. D. Raymond, M. A., in the absence of the President, was elected chairman. The meeting was largely attended and representative of the constituency. The Agenda was confined to matters of urgent importance. The action of the Executive in endorsing the recent Sanatorium Campaign was sustained and the following resolution was unanimously passed: "Resolved that the Ministerial Association of Prince Edward Island express its hearty appreciation of the very generous support given by the Protestant people of our Province to the recent Sanatorium Campaign and that a copy of this resolution be given to the press." The religious need of several of our Public Institutions was very carefully considered and a committee was appointed, representative of the various Protestant churches in Charlottetown and of the Salvation Army, to consider the whole question in co-operation with the Denominational Home Mission and Social Service Boards and the Protestant Orphanage Board, to take immediate action and to report to the next meeting of the Association. Convention which was in session and the retirement of several of the members it was decided to postpone the election of officers and the reading of the Report of the Secretary-Treasurer till the next meeting. The Association adjourned to meet again on Monday, Nov. 18th, when it is expected that Ven. Archdeacon McElhern of Winnipeg, one of the outstanding Christian leaders of Western Canada, will be present. Rev. C. N. Brown, M. A., closed the meeting with the Benediction.

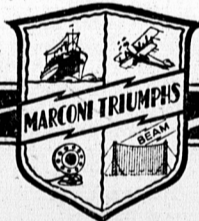
