FLORIDA TOMATO 5 MILLION DOLLAR LINE.

Florida has developed her early tomato industry almost as rapidly as she her real estate business, says the Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers. Date County on the east coast, and Manatee county on the west coast are the two big tomato counties. About 4600 acres were out this year in the two areas. Fertilizer is used heavily by practically every grower, the manure spreader, the fertilizer drill and fertilizer planter attachments being used to apply this. Garden tractors, cultivators, sprayers and weedeaters are coming in to speed up the work and cut down the man labor outlay.

U. S. FIGHTING ALFAFA WEEVIL.

"Uncle Sam's" Department of Agriculture experts have just bought out a new movie that shows how to live in the alfalfa States should be certain to see. It is called "Alfalfa Weevil Control" and shows how this western pest can be kept from the cotton boll weevil can be whipped. Spraying is particularly recommended, though dusting is also shown. Several types of sprayers are shown, one having a wide boom to give rapid coverage of a field. This pest, originally discovered in Utah, has spread to seven states and is causing much concern.

Canadian Statistics

ESTIMATED POPULATION, SOME INTERESTING CENSUS FIGURES

Historic.
The present population of Canada, according to a recent compilation made by Mr. R. H. Coates, Dominion Statistician, is given at 3,384,000. This gives an estimated increase of 864,000, during the first five years.

These figures are only given roughly. While they are pleasant reading they are not as large as they should be, and we trust that the next five years of the census will show a far greater increase, especially as it will then be an actual record.

Next to population, says this pamphlet, among national assets stand natural resources. The basic fact about Canada is that she is half a continent and still a "new" country. In agriculture, the total arable area is at least 300,000,000 acres, of which less than one-half is occupied and less than one-quarter "improved."

Though in population Canada ranks only twenty-fifth among the countries of the world, in import and export trade she ranks sixth. In exports, on a per capita basis, she stands second. Nearly half of the trade of Canada is with the United States.

The most objectionable feature of an estimated increase or decrease is found in reckoning how much it has cost the Department of Immigration for assisting immigrants to this country. Figures based on an "estimated" increase would not be a reliable calculation. It is different with the figures given above, as they rest on the census return of 1921.

It may be noted just here that when the population increases to respectable proportions the increase will multiply very much more rapidly than when it is in the smaller stage. New settlers will then have families in the calculation. These together with the natural increase of the country will no doubt swell the census returns much beyond the rate we now anticipate.

The increase of trade and commerce will inevitably multiply in the same ratio as the increase of population, so that in five years' time when the decennial census is taken there will be monuments raised to the old nation-builders such as they foresaw when they laid the foundation of the nation.

In these giant strides those who will take a retrospective glance at Canada five years hence, will have abundant reason to exult over the progress now foreseen. But there is one consideration which must not be overlooked; it is the measure of justice that is in store for the Maritime Provinces at the Capital. In their intense love of Canada and their zeal for the success of Confederation those three provinces neglected their own interests and labored to shape the progress of the West in its infantile efforts. In this way they forgot themselves too long. Therefore, it is up to them now to stand up for a fair deal. What they need now is new plans of development—not the old petty order of things—not the absent-minded policy of the King Government for the past five years. We should all join now in the slogan—"The Maritimes are Moving." The Ottawa Government, no matter which party holds the reins must shell out money for Maritime progress in the same lavish style that the centre and the west have been enriched at our expense and with our well-known zeal. The choice of candidates is now partly made and now is the time for those candidates to understand what is expected of them. Already we have the word of Hon. A. Meighen, which was expressive of sympathy. We believe he grasped what the Maritime question

The Markets

MONTREAL, Que. July 26. —Sales on the Montreal grain market today were confined the small lots the foreign demand was extremely quiet and the local trade was only fair. Car lots of No. 2 Canadian oats were quoted at 61 cents, No. 3 at 57 cents.

Prices for spring and winter wheat grades of flour were well maintained but the volume of business transacted in both cases was small. A fair amount of business was done in most lines of millfeed and the undertone was firm. Trade in standard grades of rolled oats was dull but prices were steady.

Extreme dullness marketed the butter trade but prices ruled steady. No. 1 pasteurized was offered at 33c to 33 1-2 per pound. The receipts were 2,173 packages.

The cheese market continued active and western grades were offered at 13 3-4 to 17c per pound. The receipts were 15,406 boxes.

Owing to the warm weather prevailing, the trade in eggs was quiet but the feeling was steady. Fresh extras sold at 37 to 38, and firsts at 32 per dozen. The receipts were 1,114 cases.

OTTAWA, Ont. July 26. —A weak feeling still prevails on western egg markets, but a firmer tone is reported from eastern cities.

TORONTO, July 26. —The egg market is firm with prices generally unchanged. Dealers are quoting country shippers, delivered cases returned extras 30—31, firsts 25—27, seconds 21—24. Prices to retailers extras 36—37, firsts 31—32, seconds 27—29.

MONTREAL, July 26. —Dealers are paying for local ungraded eggs, delivered extras 32—33, firsts 27—28, seconds 22—24, extras in car lots 39—40, extras 37—38, firsts 32—33, seconds 28—29. The market is quite firm with a good demand for extras and seconds.

WINNIPEG, July 26. —Receipts are dropping off, and quality is the frock beneath without extra warmth.

ST. JOHN, N. B. July 26. —The egg market is firm and higher due to light receipts. Country dealers are paying producers extras 32, firsts 28, seconds 24, and selling extras 33, firsts 29, seconds 25. Prices to retailers extras 37, firsts 34, seconds 28.

HALIFAX, N. S. July 26. —Supplies are not as freely, and quality is only fair. The market is weak and undertone is light. Dealers are paying country shippers delivered Halifax extras 30, firsts 26, seconds 18. Prices to retailers extras 36, firsts 32, seconds 27.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I. July 26. —Receipts are increasing with demand fair and dull. Wholesalers are paying country points extras 27, firsts 23, seconds 17, Jobbing extras 32, firsts 29, seconds 24.

AUTUMN FRESHENING.

One of the greatest arguments for autumn freshening is that the cow actually produces more milk. Many experiments have been tried at our experimental stations, and it has been conclusively shown that the cow freshening in autumn will produce from one-fourth to one-fifth more milk on identically the same rations. The fact that she does this is easily accounted for. In the autumn when the cow is actually at her maximum production on account of the recent birth of the calf, in addition to the pasture or roughage she generally receives a good ration of grain and roots, further stimulating this natural tendency toward larger production. Then in spring, after being fed well during the winter months, and when her lactation period is well along, she is turned out on grass, and this again stimulates her production very much. A good cow when turned on good grass, and having milked heavily during the winter, will milk during the months of June and July almost as much as though she were fresh calved.

Then in summer, when pasture is naturally short and dries are bad, she dries up, as is perfectly proper, and takes her rest period at the proper time when her owner is busy harvesting his hay and grain, and is again ready when the busy season is over to repeat her last year's record.

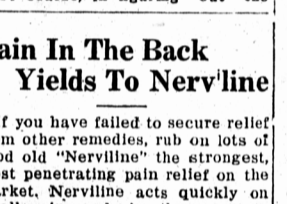
On a basis upon which a dairy farmer should discard cows from his herd is somewhat hard to determine. Where all feeds consumed by the cow are charged to her at ruling prices, her feed bill will be about sixty per cent. of actual expenses, but if feeds are charged at the actual cost of production, then the individual bill will be quite a lot less, say about fifty per cent. This looks large, but it must be borne in mind that such other factors as labor, housing, interest and depreciation tools and implements must all be considered.

Therefore a cow must not only pay for her feed alone, if she is doing this and nothing more she is not profitable. To be a real money-maker when feed is charged at the actual cost of production, she should produce enough milk to pay the bill and as much more, and then some! If your cows are not doing this you had better get rid of them or look out and find better markets for your milk and milk products.
