THE funeral of the late Alexander Montgomery, Valleyfield takes place today at 2 p. m.

THE death occurred on Thursday night last at Valleyfield of Alexander Montgomery, son of Angus Montgomery of that place and nephew of the late Donald Montgomery formerly Superintendent of Education for this Province. Mr. Montgomery was well known throughout the Island and last year entered Prince of Wales College, where through hard study he became run down and was obliged to give up his college course. After a short rest he began teaching in Valleyfield and again ill health overcame him and early in July he was forced to give up teaching until his recent death. Mr. Montgomery will be greatly missed, being a young man of exceptional promise and his death at so early an age is a severe shock to the community. IN MEMORIAM.—The death of Mrs. Thomas Barbour, of Alma, which occurred on Monday, 15th inst., following too close upon the death of Jas. B. Baker who passed away on the 13th inst., has cast a deep shadow of gloom over the whole community. Mrs. Barbour who was in her 48th year was an exceptionally fine woman, and by her kind gentle disposition and unassuming, her deep-toned piety won the affection and esteem of all who knew her. But it was in the home, as wife and mother, that the influence of her sweet self-sacrificing life was most deeply impressed and felt. There the atmosphere was ever pure and loving, the sympathy and high moral tone of the home life revealing the strength and beauty of her true Christian character. She leaves a husband and nine children, besides a very large circle of friends to mourn their loss. All her family were present when she passed away except Edward and George who reside in Boston and were unable to get home in time. Much sympathy is felt for the stricken ones in their sore bereavement. The funeral took place on Wednesday at 10 o'clock, the service being conducted by Rev. A. D. McDonald. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Jas. Barbour, Jas. B. Mountain, David Barton, George Hardy, John Barbour, and John Dinnis. The floral tributes were many and beautiful, the casket being literally covered with flowers. Slowly and sadly the long procession wended its way to the cemetery at Montrose where all that was mortal of her whom we knew and loved as Mrs. Barbour was solemnly consigned to the tomb there to await the resurrection morn.

THE following letter has been received from W. C. Kennedy of the C. P. R.: The general change of time on the Canadian Pacific, Maine Central, B & M—and I presume the Intercolonial, but I have no definite advice from them—will take effect Sunday October 12th. Commencing on that date trains will leave Boston at 7.00 p. m. with first and second class coach passengers, 7.45 with sleeping car passengers, except on Sunday night when sleepers will leave on the 7.00 p. m. train. This train will be due St. John daily except Sunday, at 11.35 a. m. Atlantic Time. The express from Montreal will leave Montreal 7.25 p. m. Eastern, and arrive St. John 11.50 a. m. Atlantic. This you will notice is only fifteen minutes later than arrival of above trains at St. John during this summer's schedule, and is exactly one hour earlier than the arrival of above trains under last winter's schedule. This will enable the Intercolonial to place the business from Montreal and New England on the Island one hour earlier than last year, and will I am sure greatly increase the traffic besides affording a very much improved local service on all points on P. E. Island. Westbound, there is also a great improvement in store for next winter's service, viz. Intercolonial have agreed to deliver the Montreal Express at St. John as at present, namely, 5.45 p. m. and the Montreal express will leave St. John 6.00 p. m. due there at 8.25 following morning, when the Boston coach passengers leaving St. John at 6.10 p. m. will be due to arrive at Boston following morning at 7.25 a. m. This will make the departure from P. E. Island probably an hour later than under last winter's schedule, and shorten the time from P. E. I. to Boston and Montreal exactly one hour.

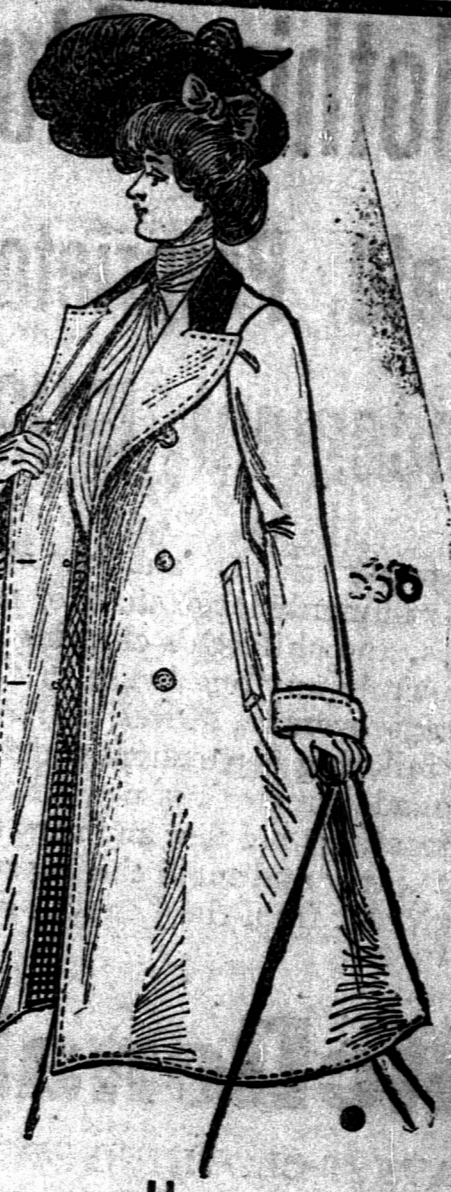
