Score Of Amateur Boxing Stars To Be Seen In Action At The Forum Tonight

Grand Circuit Opens Meet At Old Orchard

Officials last night finalized preparations for the Maritime Amateur Golden Gloves boxing championships which open here tonight in the Forum. The tournament will conclude tomorrow night.

Almost 70 boxers from all sections of the Maritimes are expected to take part in the meet. Some will be defending their crowns while others seek titles that have eluded them in the past.

Widespread enthusiasm is sweeping through the ranks of sports-lovers as the hour of the tournament draws nigh. There is an over-abundance of boxing material entered, in fact it is the largest entry list in the history of the Maritime boxing championships.

In the group are many brilliant mittmen, while all will exhibit the enthusiasm, eagerness and give-all spirit of the amateur. As examples of the material which will be on display, a few histories of contestants are here given.

Gus Vannenburg, an outstanding amateur boxer, was one of the Canadian Olympic finalists.

Wilbur Harper, ex-champion of 1935, the colored flash from Amherst.

Basel Laddlaw, in the 135 pound class, is a member of the war ship at present in port and is the champion of the Canadian Fleet.

"Bugs" Vye of Campbellton, N. B., is the 135-pound champion of northern New Brunswick.

Fred Fyfe hails from Joggins, N.S., and is the 175-pound champion of Nova Scotia.

Bobby Beaton, brother of our own Joe, is 160-pound camp of Nova Scotia. He will meet stern opposition from Jess McDonald, the Cape Breton champion, and Ron Wallace, a protege of Jack McKenna.

E. LeBlanc, in the 112-pound class, is champion of northern N.B. In the 118-pound class Wm. Patterson of Saint John is the extermarine top-notch, with Gus Hurley as the runner-up.

Carmen Glenn, Minto, N.B., was runner-up to the winner in 1936. And the list might be indefinitely extended, revealing closely-matched competitors.

In addition to individual prizes a magnificent trophy goes to the team winning most points. About half a dozen teams are so entered.

Bobby Orr, the well-known star of the ring, brings a group of six warriors.

S. E. Guilmond has an array of six north shore champions from N.B. This lot will be watching Art Garrette from St. John come with a selected team which has hopes of coping the prize.

From Cape Breton Butcher Boy McDonald is leading a crowd of good tough fighters who will give a sterling performance.

All in all individual as well as team competition promises to be of the keenest character, keeping spectators on their toes.

Tonight all the above will be seen in action and it will be a night of sock that will long be remembered. The above names are a few of the top-notchers but then there is our own Island boys who will be seeking the spotlight.

Trained to the minute 22 Island entrants will put up stiff battles in every class in which they are entered, and the hope is freely expressed that out of those 22 carrying the Island banner will emerge one or more with the mantle of "champion".

Mako And Budge Defeat Teutons To Give Team 2-1 Lead In Davis Cup Play

WIMBLEDON, England, July 19—Don Budge and Gene Mako won a four-set doubles match, from Baron Gottfried Von Cramm and Heinrich Henkel today and gave the United States an all-but-insurmountable 2-1 lead over Germany in the Davis Cup interzone finals.

Began in the first set and trailing 5-3 in the second, the Americans uncorked a rally to win four successive games in the second set, race on to take the third and then come back after the intermission to win five in a row for the fourth set and the match.

The scores were 4-6, 7-5, 8-6, 6-4 and at the end there was only seven points difference between the two combinations.

All the Americans need to gain the right to face Great Britain in the challenge round that opens Saturday is one victory in tomorrow's closing pair of singles matches. Should Henkel trip Bryan M. (Bibi) Grant of the United States, tennis experts regard Budge as a sure victor over Von Cramm in the closing match of the series. Budge thoroughly whipped Von Cramm for the All-England championship.

The first four games went to deuce but followed service. In the fifth, however, Budge and Mako broke through Von Cramm's delivery and went on to take a 4-2 lead behind Don's steaming service. The Teutons broke through Mako in the eighth game to draw even at four-all and then cracked Budge's delivery in the 10th game for the set.

After the first seven games of the second set had followed service, Von Cramm, almost single handedly broke up Budge's cannonball delivery for a 5-3 lead.

The Californians mastered Henkel's service in the ninth game and Mako served and smashed the team into a 5-3 score in the 10th game.

The Californians took the next game on a double fault and won the set at 7-5 when Budge held his service in the 12th game.

Service breaks, against Henkel and Mako respectively, marked the first two games of the third set and things went serenely until the 10th game when the Germans twice were within a point of breaking Mako's service and taking the set. The blond star from Los Angeles came through with a great smash and daring shot to the deep left to pull out the game. The Americans finally broke Henkel's service in the 13th game and ran out the set 8-6 on Mako's service.

All even at 1-1 in the fourth set, the Germans took successive love games on Henkel's, Mako's and Von Cramm's service, for a 4-1 lead.

The Americans conjured up another rally to take the set and match.

C.M.P. and Arthur Pitts, 12-year-old Halifax spectator.
