CLOSING YEAR

ed a success yielding 25 bus. of oats per acre, where no crop had been produced for years; the adjacent part of the field was too wet for cultivation this year.

Greater results are expected when this drained area is under cultivation.

Considerable surveying for under-drainage has been done; the laying of tile has been supervised at West Cape and East Point. Requests for this work promise a busy season next year.

The season has been quite favorable for the production and harvesting of large crops; the pastures have been good and the supply of milk to the factories has been large. The prices have been considerably above normal.

Thus the returns have been quite satisfactory. One of the greatest needs is improvement in the live stock; the markets are nearby and the improvement in transportation facilities will certainly be a stimulus.

THE FISHERIES

Lobster fishing in Prince Edward Island during the year has been satisfactory and a considerable increase over the catch of the previous year is reported. The fishermen received a higher price for live lobsters and their earning capacity was thus materially increased.

It is pleasing to note that there has been a substantial increase in the catch of cod, hake, and other ground fish with good results to both fishermen and exporters.

It has been suggested that a great advantage to the fishermen of P. E. Island would be the erection of small cod storage plants at the different fishing centres in order that fishermen could be supplied continuously with fresh bait.

IN CHARLOTTETOWN

Owing to the war there was not as much activity in civic circles as under normal conditions. Nevertheless a considerable amount of important work was accomplished.

Perhaps the most important undertaking was the installation of the new power pump at the main pumping station, putting the city on a footing of absolute security as far as the water supply is concerned. A powerful new boiler is now being installed in No. 1 station for use in connection with the driving of the new pump. No. 2 the auxiliary station has been enlarged and a new pump and engine have been installed there. The purchase of a modern chemical engine and five hundred more feet of new hose, along with the improvements above noted, should go a considerable way towards putting Charlottetown in a position of safety from loss by fire.

The plan to make an extension of the Fire Department's quarters this year, unfortunately, had to be abandoned, but it is hoped that this much needed improvement will be brought about next year. The installing of a new boiler in the basement of the City Hall for the proper heating of the building was a much needed move as was also the placing of new oak doors inset with plate glass at the entrance of the City building.

Though no permanent sidewalks were laid down this year, a surprising amount of other work, under the supervision of City Engineer Nicholson was accomplished of which the following may be briefly mentioned:

General repairs to stone-crushing plant. New concrete foundation and new stone bins.

Grading and graveling 5459 square yards of street on O'Leary, Fitzroy, King Streets and on Kensington Road. Putting down 4519 running feet of storm water sewer on the West End of Kent Street, on Rochford Street and on Brighton Road, also on North River Road.

Putting down 3300 square yards of new macadam at the western end of Kent Street.

Putting down eleven thousand running feet of new wood sidewalk and general repairs throughout the city.

Remaking and rounding up eight miles of clay street throughout the City and common.

Resurfacing the driveway in Victoria Park.

BUILDING OPERATIONS IN CHARLOTTETOWN. Building operations in Charlottetown during 1916 were no doubt to a large extent hampered by war con-

ditions but the fact that some thirty building projects for industrial purposes is a very creditable showing, all things considered. This work included two notable buildings projects for industrial purposes—a can-making factory and an extension to the Charlottetown Egg Canning Station.

The can-making factory is a 70x40 two storey structure, situated on Escher Street, near the Condensed Milk Factory. The machinery is now installed and it is expected that work will soon begin.

By an addition eighty feet in length to the rear of the Egg Canning Station on Weymouth the building now stands over a site 160x30 feet. This entire building is of brick and the work shows the great faith the promoters have in the future of the Egg Industry in this Province. Big things are looked for and by all indications they will be realized.

Especially worthy of note also is the remodeling of almost complete rebuilding of the store building on Lower Queen Street, formerly occupied by Mr. Stewart as a restaurant and the Kelly-Taylor Co., grocers. This building is being rebuilt in brick instead of wood and will contain up-to-date store apartments and offices.

The work is being done for Mr. T. B. Riley. Among the residences built during the year particularly worthy of mention is the fact that the modern apartment house was built at Brighton by Mr. Ivan Y. Reddin. This house has compartments for four families two on the first flat, and two above.

The house is fitted with all modern innovations making for comfort and convenience, and is thoroughly up-to-date in every way.

A decidedly fine residence is that of Mr. A. E. Duff on the North River Road. It is built in American Colonial style and cost some \$15,000. Needless to say it is splendidly finished throughout and the workmanship is a credit to the contractors; Messrs H. & S. Lowe.

Another notable building project in the same locality is the large double tenement house of Mr. Russell E. White. This house is originally built for Admiral Bayfield and was for many years the home of the late Mr. W. C. White, Registrar of Deeds. The building was this summer removed to its present location on North River Road and practically rebuilt and made into a two-tenement structure.

Other new houses built this year include: A fine new residence on Villa Street for Mr. F. J. Holman. In the same locality on Ambrose Street new residences for Messrs S. L. Hardy and Arthur McEachern.

On Water Street an old building remodelled and made into a handsome cottage for Dr. Blanchard. On Gerald Street residences built by Messrs M. P. Hogan and J. O'Neill.

On Euston Street new double houses for Mrs. P. H. Trainor; also new residence for Mr. Augustine Galvan.

On Fitzroy Street East new residence for Mr. Lemuel Winchester. On Edward Street new residences for Mr. D. W. Swan and Mr. Lorne Harper.

On Bayfield Street new double tenement for Mr. John Wheatley. On School Street and Hillsborough Streets, new residences for Mr. Samuel Kennedy, Sr.

On Rochford Street, new residence for Mr. F. J. Hennessey. On Dorchester Street double tenement for Miss Mary Murray.

On Brighton Avenue double tenement for Mr. E. M. Parnat. On Upper Prince Street, work has been started on a new residence for Mrs. Ralph Rogers.

On Cumberland Street, new residence for Mr. Walter Power. Houses are being rebuilt or remodelled. Mr. N. M. Macdonald on Spring Street; Mr. N. C. Casford on Douglas Street and Messrs Chipman and Mason on Green Street.

The Cundall brick property on King Street is also being remodelled and made into a home for young women according to the wish expressed in the will of the late owner.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT. The year now drawing to a close, thanks to the prowess of Charlottetown's able aggregation of fire-fighters was not marked by any very serious conflagration in the city. There were a total of twenty-nine alarms in all sent in, including the one for fire at Summerside. The previous year there were only nineteen alarms. With the addition of the new chemical engine it is hoped that Charlottetown will be in a better position than ever before to protect this city from the ravages of fire.

SUMMERSIDE

On December 13th. after a period of prosperity and commercial activity unprecedented in its history, Summerside was visited by a disastrous conflagration which swept both sides of Water Street from Queen and Central Streets to Summer Street and nearly plucked commenced operations in temporary quarters pending the erection in the Spring of new business homes. Like many similar disasters this fire was a blessing in disguise as by-laws have already been enacted requiring that all buildings henceforth erected along Water Street shall be of other material than wood. Summerside will arise from this temporary setback with the vigour displayed after the serious conflagration of ten years previously. Navigation to and from the Western capital closed for the season this morning when the Northumberland leaves for Charlottetown.

GEORGETOWN

For the first time since the outbreak of the war barracks were instituted in Georgetown and a portion of the 105th quartered there last winter. The presence of these young men brightened up the town considerably.

A regular moving picture show for a few months during the winter and spring helped greatly to brighten the life of the town.

The Railway Wharf was considerably damaged by drift ice last spring but is now undergoing repairs. Mr. John Stewart has erected a splendid cottage on Water Street, equipped with all the modern conveniences.

Mr. Douglas MacDonald has also established a convenient and comfortable home on Water Street near the Railway Station.

Mr. W. W. Jenkins and Mr. John Dalziel have added improvements to their already well appointed residences.

A new Grocery Business has been established on Kent Street by Mr. John McKinnon.

A new Gasoline Ferry Boat, built by Mr. Charles Fitzgerald, is now running on the route between Cardigan and Georgetown.

Marriages and deaths have been comparatively infrequent during the year. Among the older residents who have joined the great majority are: Mrs. Andrew Glover, Mrs. Walter Gordon and Capt. Daniel Walker.

The Presbyterian and Anglican Churches have been repaired and now present a much more pleasing appearance.

St. David's Presbyterian Church has had the entire interior remodelled and improved lighting installed. Bazaars have been held by the Presbyterian Church and the Women's Institute which were well patronized and very successful.

A pleasing incident of the year was a Spinning Frolic which was held in the interests of the Woman's Institute. Over thirty spinners with old-fashioned spinning wheels spent the afternoon preparing yarn for the soldiers use.

Rev. Canon Simpson also representing the Patriotic Society, said he was very happy to welcome Gunner Doiron back. "We all ought to be thankful," said he, "to this man who has gone out and suffered in our defense." The Canon said he hoped this reception would be no mere flash in the pan, but that he and others like him should be looked after, looked up to and honored for what they have done. He hoped Gunner Doiron would not stop working for the cause, but would act point out to the slackers their duty. The Canon went on to say that there are 13,000 men of military age, apparently quite able physically, a good many of whom have "cold feet." He hoped the presence of the returned heroes would inspire those who were holding back so that they too would finally come in for a share of praise.

Other speakers who spoke in terms of welcome and praise were Messrs

A. E. Morrison, Councillors, J. T. McKenzie, and P. A. Smith, Major H. D. Johnson, M. D., Colonel Jenkins, M. D. and Major Leigh. Gunner Doiron made a brief and fitting reply thanking the Mayor and different speakers for their kind words. He incidentally remarked that he thought it wrong that a great many married men with wives and young children at home, were fighting and dying for their country while thousands of single men remained at home who could very well go. He also spoke against the enlistment of boys under age, stating that a young boy isn't fit for the front. It is a man's job and one needs to be a man in this fight for freedom, said he.

At the conclusion of his remarks hearty cheers were given for Gunner Doiron and the gathering dispersed after the singing of the National Anthem.

Stephen Dolron enlisted on Aug. 7th, 1914, in the First Contingent Can-

adian Artillery and was one of the first eleven men to enlist, including Ohie Davey who returned home a few months ago. Gunner Dolron sailed from Canada with the First Contingent in October 1914, after being in training at Valcartier. He spent about three months on Salisbury Plain, and went to France on February 7th, 1915. He took part in the fighting around Loos, Givency, Ypres, Plug Street, then back to Ypres again, and then to the Somme.

On September 2nd, after he had been on the Somme front for a few days, he was "blown up" by a high explosive shell, being hurled about ten feet in the air. The gun he was serving at the time was put out of action. Other members of the gun crew were also "blown up" but fortunately without fatal results. Dolron suffered severely from the concussion and was under treatment in No. 18 General Hospital and Epsom. He has received his discharge. He is looking well.
