Joseph A. Kelly and J. A. Trainor, City, as delegates from the Knights of Columbus, left last night for Pictou to meet the body of J. Lynch, formerly of Glenfinnan, P. E. I., who died in Ottawa a few days ago.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Joseph McIntyre, Rosebank, will leave the residence of her brother, Sextus McLellan, 46 Prince Street, City, at one fifteen p. m. today. The interment will be from the home of her parents in Grand River to the St. Patrick's Church Cemetery.

Neil McNevin, City, Chief Ranger of Court Charlottetown, C. O. F., has received a commission as District High Chief Ranger from the High Chief Ranger of the order in Perth, Ontario. # THE BROKEN TRAIL

The Broken Trail is the title of an illustrated volume of 189 pages, written by Rev. George W. Kerby, B. A., pastor of the Central Methodist Church, Calgary. The volume is issued by the publishing house of William Briggs, Toronto. The contents are made up of three or four vivid incidents with which Mr. Kerby was in personal contact in the Northwest, and he has told them all in a graphic and readable fashion.

The first of these sketches, entitled A Son of Holland, is a real good love story which begins in trouble and ends happily. The second, entitled The Desperado, is the story of a young man, who was hanged for murder, and to whom Mr. Kerby ministered in his last hours and received his dying confession. He attributed his early departure from a good mother's counsels and the path of rectitude to reading dime novels. The third sketch, entitled The Outcast, is a pathetic story of a young girl who was betrayed, deserted, but died penitent and hopeful. The final sketch, The Forbidden City, tells that within every city, large or small, there is a lesser city, black and foul, devoted to vice and lust. The writer makes a powerful and moving plea for rescue work among those fallen ones.

The entire book is wholesome and helpful, and many will be the better for a careful perusal of it.
