Resigned

TORONTO, July 4.—(By The Canadian Press)—Senator A. C. Hardy, of Brockville, Ont., has resigned the Presidency of the Ontario Liberal Association, a position he had held continuously for nearly 15 years.

It is announced that Senator Hardy, while retiring as President will continue as a member of the management committee of the association. The announcement says many times in the past when Senator Hardy desired to relinquish the position of President he was prevailed upon by Liberals generally to continue as head of the organization, and agreed with reluctance.

Reduction in Price Of Binder Twine

WINNIPEG, July 4.—(By The Canadian Press)—A consignment of binder twine manufactured in Great Britain for United Grain Growers has been ordered shipped to Saskatoon by the Churchill route on the Steamship Pennyworth, expected to be the first vessel to arrive at the Hudson Bay Port this year, it was announced here Saturday by R. S. Law, President of the U. G. G. Price of twine has declined this season to the lowest level in many years, Mr. Law noted. He said on an average throughout the west, prices will be approximately \$1-3 cents per pound lower than last year and estimated the savings to farmers would amount to \$2,500,000. Farmers probably will pay eight to nine cents a pound for twine, compared with 14 to 15 cents two years ago and as high as 26 cents during the war.

Brought Truce In Canton's Civil Strife

HONGKONG, China, July 4.—Description of most of the Cantonese air force brought home today of a truce in Canton's civil strife, involving the rebellious navy of Admiral Chan Chak. The air force, under General Chan Chai-Tong, which has been operating against the rebels, was crippled by the desertion of 30 flyers, including many North American-trained aviators and representing 80 percent of the total air strength. The flyers refused to take part in further attacks upon Hainan, seat of Admiral Chan's separatist naval administration, declaring adherence to the recent statement of their former leader, Chang Wai-Chung, that the air force would not be available for future civil wars.

S. S. Ungava On Inspection Trip

MONTREAL, July 4.—The S. S. Ungava next Saturday will begin a journey of some 10,000 miles through the northern waters of the Dominion, she reached here yesterday to begin loading stores and supplies for posts of the Hudson's Bay Company and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Seventeen points will be visited before the vessel reaches St. John's Nfld., about September 25. Major D. L. McKeand of the Dominion Lands Administration, Department of the Interior, will be in charge of this year's expedition, having with him 16 federal officials. Dr. J. B. Piegay, of the Department of Pensions and National Health has been appointed to investigate the health of the natives at the various posts. Dr. J. R. West, a pathologist from the Department of Agriculture will make a survey of the Eskimo dog situation with a view to improving the health and increasing the numbers of these animals. Inspector T. V. Sandys-Wunsch will go north in charge of a detail of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, inspecting the various detachments and superintending the relief of constables whose tour of duty has been served. THE MARITIME SMOKE

R.C.M.P. WORK IN MARITIMES

The following comprehensive summary of the new R. C. M. P. organization in the Maritime Provinces appears in the June issue of the Canadian Police Bulletin:

On April 1st, 1932, by agreement between the Dominion Government and the Governments of the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police took over the policing of the two Provinces and by a similar agreement made a little later with the Province of Prince Edward Island, they took over the policing of that Province on May 1st, 1932. In addition, the Preventive Service throughout the Dominion was taken over by the R. C. M. P. from the Department of National Revenue on April 1st.

The three Maritime Provinces were formed as a District known as the Maritime Provinces District which is under the command of Assistant Commissioner, Lieut.-Col. C. Junget, who has established his headquarters at Moncton, N. B. Each of the three provinces form a Division of the R.C.M.P. under the command of the following: "H" Division, Halifax, under Superintendent C. D. LaNauze; "J" Division, Fredericton, under Superintendent E. C. P. Salt, who at the time of taking over was Commissioner of the N. B. P. P.; "L" Division, Charlottetown, under Inspector Fripps. Nearly all the personnel of the respective Police Forces were absorbed in the R.C.M.P. and the officers given rank in seniority correspondingly. The same applies to the Preventive Service as well. Two of the Divisional Chiefs, A. T. Logan, Halifax, and L. A. Gagnon, St. John, having been appointed Inspectors in the R. C. M. P. Inspector Blake at Halifax who organized the N. S. P. P. forces and who was a Staff Sergeant in the R. C. M. P., was promoted to the

NEW YORK, July 4.—(Canadian Press)—

The century-long cordiality between Canada and the United States is one of the world's best examples of neighbors living generation after generation in peace and amity, the Rev. Dr. Samuel Henry Prince, of Halifax, N. S., said in an Independence Day sermon at St. Stephen's Protestant Episcopal Church today.

"What the nations of the world need is less of precept and more of example," Dr. Prince said. "All Canadians will unite in offering greetings and felicitations to their southern neighbors and kinsmen upon the return of the national birthday of the United States. What Americans have achieved by evolution within the British Commonwealth of Nations. Nevertheless, to the extent that the events commemorated at this time precipitated the development of British liberty, independence day assumes international significance."
