THE ENGLISH SCHOOL QUESTION.

There is every evidence that the school question in England has become a burning question. The public mind is greatly stirred over it and the press and public men from Mr. Balfour down are engaged in discussing it. Hitherto a very large proportion of the schools in England have been known as voluntary schools, because supported by voluntary subscriptions. They are also called "church schools" in the discussion now going on, because they have been instituted and managed by Churchmen and because the Church catechism is taught in them all. Mr. Balfour's Bill places the voluntary or church school, "on the rates," to be maintained by school taxation levied upon the ratepayers at large.

The main features of objection were very clearly stated by Mr. Bryce in the House of Commons, as follows:

"In 8,000 parishes of this country the schools are held to belong to the Church of England, and the managers are members of that body. The threefold grievance of the Nonconformists in these localities is first that the clergyman and his friends were practically omnipotent; second that the Nonconformists cannot get Bible religious instruction without instruction in the Church catechism; and third, that the teachers all belong to the Church of England.

All the cost of carrying on these schools under the operation of the new Bill will be defrayed by public money, but the ratepayers' representatives on the school boards will be restricted to one third of the board membership, the Church authorities appointing the remaining two thirds. In Canada such a proposition could not obtain a momentary support, so fully are our people grounded in the principle that public control must accompany the expenditure of public money. In England the numerical strength and great wealth of the Established Church are such as to give it a preponderating influence alike in Parliament and the country. None the less large numbers of liberal-minded members of the Church of England are joining with the Nonconformists in opposing the Bill. It was thus in the Provinces of British America in the old days when Family Compacts and Church and State were vexed questions in our public affairs. In those days liberal-minded Churchmen not only assisted but became leaders in the reform movement.

We have read with much interest Mr. Balfour's first speech to a public meeting since he became Premier, in which he dealt with the school question. At the outset he makes light of the "Nonconformist grievance," and asserts that his Bill mitigates rather than increases any just cause of complaint from that quarter. He proceeds to argue that the Opposition have no plan of their own; that there are only three possible solutions of the educational question and the Government have chosen the best and the only practicable course. The first solution would be to have nothing to do with religion in the schools. This the country would not stand. The second possible solution is that in vogue in Scotland—that each locality should be free to choose for itself what kind of religious or denominational teaching it should have in its schools. That suited Scotland admirably but would not be accepted by either Churchmen or Nonconformists in England.

Mr. Balfour admitted that his Bill is of the nature of a compromise—"that in certain schools the people may have undenominational teaching and in other schools you must allow the parents that fuller kind of religious teaching which is earnestly desired by so many parents." Before concluding he made the admission that next session another Bill would be introduced making this measure applicable to London, which is now exempted from its operation. This admission is likely to arouse a further storm of opposition. It had the immediate effect of reducing the Government majority upon these

clauses of the Bill which were adopted after Mr. Balfour's speech referred to was delivered. In fact there are many indications that the feeling against the Education Bill is increasing in both volume and intensity, although the opposition is made up of conflicting elements which it will difficult to combine effectively. Whether the Liberal leaders will be able to make such use of the growing discontent as will effect their restoration to power at the next election remains to be seen.

The New York Herald complains of the defect in the United States system which permits law-makers to remain in office after they have ceased to reflect the sentiments of their constituents. The Congress to be elected this autumn will not be called to meet before the end of next year. "In this lack of prompt response to popular feeling," remarks The Herald, "our system of representation stands in need of radical reform." Just so, and so it has been in the Republic for one hundred and twenty years past. Up here in Canada, on the contrary, if a defeated party does not get out of office voluntarily within a month after the people have pronounced their verdict at the polls we begin to talk of the sacred right of rebellion. The quicker Uncle Sam remodels his political institutions on the Canadian plan the sooner he will be up to date.

The Manufacturers' Association now in session at Halifax have unanimously resolved that "the changed conditions which now obtain in Canada demand the immediate and thorough revision of the tariff upon lines which will more effectively transfer to the workshops of the Dominion manufacturers many goods which we now import from other countries." In other words they want more protection, not now on the ground put forward in 1877 that our factories are "infant" and "struggling" industries, but presumably that the manufacturers may be able to make larger profits at the expense of the mass of consumers. We are strongly of opinion that if any revision or readjustment of the tariff is needed it should be in the way of reduction. Every one remembers the plaintive wail of 1893 that our industries would be ruined if another party came into power and reduced the rates of duty. And yet since 1896 our manufacturing industries have enjoyed unexampled expansion and prosperity.
