

REV. R. W. STEVENSON'S DISCOURSE IN Y. M. C. A.

(Continued from First Page.) and wheat harvests were waved before the Lord. The first fruits of the barley harvest was a type of the resurrection of Christ from the dead.

Love governs the observance of this day. Love needs no law, but overcomes every hindrance in her pathway to serve the object of her devotion.

Those who have made the laws of our country realized that righteousness exalts the nation, hence a day has been set apart that the people may be taught of God and caused to worship Him.

But the day is profaned. Many are guilty before God in this matter. The man who opens his saloon profanes the day, transgresses the law of the land and the law of love.

The man who lounges about home on the Lord's day reading the daily or weekly when he should be in attendance at the pub-

lic worship of God is a profaner of of the Lord's Day. The apostle urges that we neglect not the assembling of ourselves together; but meet to worship God in spirit and in truth.

There are certain things that must be done—such as feeding the cattle in the stall—saving life, mending breaches to save from the destruction of property—putting out fires and such like tasks.

The day is in memory of the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead and is a day of worship. If we love, honor and fear our God we shall be found waiting upon our God on that day, holding sweet communion with Him.

The insane love of pleasure that feeds the appetite of passion and criminal recklessness leads young men to lose sight of the necessity of the sacredness of the Lord's Day.

On this blessed day men are set free from toil, the ledger is closed on the desk, the hammer rests on the anvil the wheel in the factory, the plough stands in the furrow and on this new born day the homes of our land should send forth their members to worship God, and listen to the whole earth rendering universal praise and thanks giving to our God, the God of the universe.

This day calls to us to sacrifice earth for Heaven—and time for eternity. God and all good men are concerned for the faithful observance of the Lord's day. Let us be jealous for the honest concern we have for the sacredness of this blessed day.

What is profanation? Webster defines it as "the act of violating sacred things—treating them with irreverence and contempt." The law-abiding citizen—the man who loves and fears God and regards His worship as essential to the growth and perpetuity of the highest and best civilization will not be a party to the profanation of the Lord's day but will regard it as sacred to the Lord—a holy day.

But the day is profaned. Many are guilty before God in this matter. The man who opens his saloon profanes the day, transgresses the law of the land and the law of love. The man who frequents the saloon is a partner in the transgression. These men have no respect for God or man. The men who meet in clubs to smoke, drink and play cards are guilty of profaning the day. He is aiding in breaking down this bulwark of righteousness in the nation. The man who goes driving during the hours of worship is also guilty. I do not say it is wrong to drive between the hours of worship. There is liberty right here. But there is no liberty given men to rob God and men of that which is so needful. POPE LEO'S POEM.

On the 33rd Anniversary of His Birth.

New York, March 18.—Here is Dr. William H. Ward's metrical translation, published in this week's Independence, of the remarkable Latin poem with which the Pope has just celebrated his ninety-third birthday and the twenty-fifth anniversary of his election to the papal throne. The pope himself calls the poem Leo's Last Prayer. Copies have been presented by his holiness to each of the cardinals of the Sacred College.

Leo, now sets thy sun, pale in its dying ray,

Black night succeeds thy day,

Black night for thee, wasted thy frame:

Life's flood sustains Death casts his fatal dart.

Robbed for the grave, thy bones Lie under the cold stones.
