Associated Study Clubs At Kensington

The associated study clubs of Kensington and vicinity met in the McMahon House, Kensington, on Tuesday night, Sept. 26th. Mr. Borden Fraser presided and introduced Dr. Croteau the first speaker of the evening. Dr. Croteau remarked on the continuous growth of the co-operative movement in Prince Edward Island. He said there were now 41 Credit Unions with something over seventy thousand dollars in savings. He believed the directors and committees of a credit union should become familiar with the duties of all officers as well as their own particular office and suggested meeting once a month for the purpose of studying the bookkeeping system and duties of officers. He expressed pleasure at seeing so many women interested and thought it should have a good influence in the organization. Dr. Croteau answered several questions in an interesting and instructive manner. Mr. E. C. Chandra, of the National Library, Island Libraries was the next speaker. He warned the members not to become wildly enthusiastic over new ideas which proved in many cases to be not very feasible but to study well before launching forth on co-operative ventures. He said the keynote of success in a Credit Union was "ownership" and it was the task of the credit unions to bring back ownership to the masses. Pointing the way to success his quotation from Kipling was very appropriate. "It is not the guns nor the money nor the army as a whole. But the everlasting teamwork. Of every blooming soul." Mrs. Fraser presided and tendered the speakers, moved by Mr. J. L. Saunders and seconded by Mr. Keir Duggan. The singing of the National Anthem brought the meeting to a close—S.



adequate supplies of Raw Sugar Will Be Available

OTTAWA, Sept. 24 (CP)—Adequate supplies of raw sugar will be available in Canada as a result of an agreement just concluded with the United Kingdom it was announced today by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board headed by Hector B. MacKinnon.

The agreement provides that the sugar controller of the United Kingdom will re-sell to Canadian refiners at cost, sufficient raw sugar from British areas to meet Canadian requirements.

The bulk of this raw sugar will probably come from the West Indies. Officials here explained that in addition the crop of sugar beets grown in Canada will also be coming on the market within three weeks. No definite estimate of the crop is available. Last year's crop was 577,000 tons which would produce about 150,000,000 pounds of sugar and it is expected this year's crop will be approximately the same.


