**NOW IT'S A BEAR.**—A young bear arrived in Charlottetown by the Northumberland Monday night from Sydney. The cub attracted much attention at the Railway Station yesterday afternoon from the moving throng. The animal proceeded to its destination in Tignish by the 3.44 p. m. train, the receiver being A. M. Lynch. Some of the younger set who make it a practice to loiter around the depot seem to take great delight in irritating wild animals while in their boxes. A number of boys could be seen yesterday afternoon teasing the young cub by prodding it with sticks, etc. This is something the authorities ought to put a stop to.

**BODY FOUND.**—The last of the bodies from the ill-fated schooner "Polara" has been found. While Messrs James and Daniel Taylor of St. Peter's Island were going along the shore on Saturday morning they found the body, which was hardly recognizable. The flesh was completely off the face, head and hands, the men produced a sail and covered the remains, bringing them well up on the shore, and as the water was too stormy to put out a boat yesterday they could not get word to the city until yesterday morning, when M. Hennessey was brought out in Wm. McInnis' power boat. The body was brought to Mr. Hennessey's undertaking room and was interred as soon after as possible.

**SERVICES APPRECIATED.**—An interesting feature of the course at the recent Summer School for Teachers, was the physical training and instruction given by Mr. Louis McMillan, Assistant Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. During the eleven days of the school Mr. McMillan did very valuable and efficient work. It was somewhat strenuous too, as he put in an average, eight hours a day. That the teachers appreciate his work is shown by the fact that the members of the young men's class presented him with a set of gold cuff links and an address signed on behalf of the members by C. Braden Jelly and Lloyd M. Shaw, and the young ladies' class with a Bible and an address signed by Misses Bessie MacDonald, Lizzie MacKinnon, Ida Cumisky and Florence Vickerson.

**A FRIENDLY VISIT.**—In the early morning of yesterday, about 5 o'clock, some people in the vicinity of Government Pond, in the west end of the city, were awakened by a curious whooping sound, which appeared to come from the water and which they could not understand. A quick investigation it was found to be two large birds of the crane type. They flew at a prodigious height in the air and as they came along performed great evolutions. Their wings, rounded rather than elongated, as in other species of birds, stiffened in the breeze as the birds soared and circled, and their long stem-like legs stuck out straight behind them. The birds finally alighted in the pond in search of food. Here those watching had a better view of them, and it was seen that they stood between four and five feet high. Their plumage was pure white with the tips of the wings black, and in getting the fish from the water they used their bills as one would a dagger, while eating they were disturbed by game dogs and rose again in the air flying as before in quest of a quiet feeding ground. The birds were probably cranes of the Whooping or American genus, as this family migrates to the north in the summer, but rather into the interior than to the eastern part of the Continent, and although often seen in this province, it is rare if ever that they have come to the city.
