Biennial Conference of Girls' Work Secretaries. The Girls' Work Secretaries of Canada have held their second biennial conference. This took place in Toronto, April 14-22, paralleling the Boys' and Children's Work Conference already reported in this column. Unlike the gathering of two years ago—the National Girls' Work Camp held at Lake Couchiching—this was purely secretarial, each Provincial Religious Education Council except British Columbia being represented by its employed Girls' Work Secretary, as follows: Alberta—Miss Evelyn Storey; Saskatchewan—Miss Jessie Maxwell; Manitoba—Miss Wilhelmina Dolmage; Ontario—Miss Mabel Taggart; Quebec—Miss Dais Gass; The Maritimes—Miss Mary Allison; National Secretary for Presbyterian Church—Miss May Gemmill; National Secretary for Methodist Church—Miss Mary Gemmill.

Church—Miss Winifred Thomas, of the Conference time was spent in discussion of various phases of the program and the working out of new policies of program and promotion work which will strengthen the C.G.I.T. work in the future. Next year's work will show the significance of this side of the conference.

But the annual meeting of the National Girls' Work Board which was held Monday, April 23rd and Thursday, April 26th, showed the deep significance of the Girls' Work done in the past two years. Every item under discussion was bristling with interest and marked progress. However, the part of the sessions which held greatest interest of all were the field reports of the different Girls' Work Secretaries. These were not detailed but rather intended to picture in a vivid way the outstanding features of the development of the work in each province. Reports led us from British Columbia where Girls' Work is going steadily forward in spite of the handicap of no employed Secretary; to Alberta and Saskatchewan where straitened economic conditions have forced the girls to eliminate from their program of local work any attractive features such as conference supper—Mother and Daughter Banquets, etc., at the same time deepening their sense of responsibility to stand beside their parents in meeting these times of stress; to Manitoba where splendid financial conditions together with public support, are hastening the advance of Girls' Work; to Ontario where the largest number of groups and organized activities are in operation; to Quebec where Girls' Work has made a strong impact in a city-wide way in the metropolis of Canada; and lastly to the Maritimes where the quiet intensive work of the Girls' Council in many centres typifies the steady rate of progress which has attended the program there. Full statistical data will appear later. Suffice it to say that most conservative estimates place the total number of Canadian Girls in Training at well over the 30,000 mark. While numbers are not the criterion by which we judge yet they do gauge in no uncertain way the degree to which the C. G. I. T. standards of life and service are finding a place in the minds and hearts of Canadian Girlhood.

C.G.I.T. Demonstration Night.

On Thursday, May 10, the Canadian Girls in Training of St. John held a Demonstration night in the Sunday School Hall of Centenary Church. In spite of the many other attractions of the week the large audience which was present gave evidence of the interest felt by the community in this work. The purpose of the meeting was a dual one—namely a public demonstration of the aims of the program and the way it works out in the local church; secondly, the raising of funds for improved equipment for the Provincial Training Camp—Camp Wegelessum, Chatham, N.B. The various churches contributed the different numbers. The program which was of an unusually high order, comprised the following: Opening Tableau—"Canadian Girlhood"; explanatory remarks re C.G.I.T.; pageant—"The Way"; special musical number: The new Group Initiation Ceremony of C.G.I.T., Pantomime—"O Zion Haste"; Original Camp Scene. Every selection gave evidence of the high ideals and excellent training which the teenage girls are receiving under the program in their church groups. Door receipts and funds from the sale of candy during intermission were tangible evidence that the secondary object of the gathering was achieved. On May 15th the girls of Halifax will close their year's work with a similar demonstration.
