KENTVILLE SHOWS THE WAY TO NEW GLASGOW 5 TO 2

Last Night In Home Rink - Losers Play "Kents" Tonight In New Glasgow In Final Of Home And Home Games.

(Canadian Press) KENTVILLE, N. S., March 13.—The game was hard fought from start to finish with the New Glasgow team furnishing splendid hockey throughout the fixture, but the combination of the winners proved the downfall of the New Glasgow side.

The game tonight at New Glasgow will tell the tale, as to the team that will meet the "dairy-town aggregation."

The brand of hockey handed out by the losers tonight has every indication that the game in their home rink will be a thriller from bell to bell.

Ten pair of skates will also be presented to the Maritime champion team from the Starr Company. In addition the M. A. H. A. will present gold medals to the champions.

Following the final game at Sussex Monday night the M. A. H. A. will hold their annual meeting, when reports of the association will be submitted and officers elected.

STANLEY CUP WILL BE WON IN OTTAWA

OTTAWA, March 13.—Montreal Canadians, National League champions, will play their Stanley Cup series on Ottawa's artificial ice, according to Leo Dandurand, manager of the Canadians. It is likely the champions will train here.

Dempsey Will Defend Title Against Firpo

CHAMPION SAYS HE WILL MEET THE ARGENTINE IN NEW YORK ON LABOR DAY.

NEW YORK, March 13.—Despite increasing indications that the proposed return match in the Metropolitan district, early in June between Jack Dempsey and Tom Gibbons, would be shelved, Tex Rickard declared tonight he was still in the field for the match and would make a definite offer within a few days to Jack Kearns, the champion's manager.

Faced with the statements of Dempsey and Kearns that the titleholder's next bout and only 1924 battle probably would be against Luis Firpo in September, Rickard reiterated that he is going ahead with the Dempsey-Gibbons plans. The promoter already has Gibbons' consent to the terms.

ST. JOHN TEAM HOLD SUSSEX SCORELESS TIE

ST. JOHN, March 13.—The St. John team moved up another notch in hockeydom Wednesday evening at the Arena when they held the fast Sussex team, champions of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and contenders for the Maritime title, scoreless throughout three periods of intensely interesting hockey. To the local aggregation belongs the distinct honor of being the first team this season to hold the team from the Dairy Town scoreless for that length of time.

No overtime was played last evening in view of the fact that the Sussex boys have their work cut out for them during the next week or so when they meet the winners from Nova Scotia for the Maritime Province championship.

The game last night, in view of the rather sticky ice, was full of thrills from start to finish. Both teams played their best and the general impression was that St. John, in holding the fast champions to a scoreless tie, proved that right here in our own midst is a hockey team of whom the city should feel proud.

CHILIAN HEAVY EXPECTED TO BE GREAT ATTRACTION

Comes To This Side Of The Pond With Better Record Than "Luis"—Has Some Indian And a Strain Of Italian Blood—Is Exceptionally Strong And Rugged.

NEW YORK, March 14.—Quintin Romero, the leading short paper of Paris, Chil, who is being brought to this country by Tex Rickard for a shot at the heavyweight championship, may turn out to be an attraction just as big as Luis Firpo.

Romero has all the circus color of Firpo, and he has more of an advantage in coming out at a time when a vogue has been established for his race. He has another thing in his favor because he arrives with something of a reputation and considerable noise, while Firpo sneaked in from South America unknown and unheralded.

Firpo, however, had friendly hands to clear the way for him after he got started, but Romero will have to pull himself up practically alone if he succeeds in getting up.

While Firpo was allowed to feast on set-ups, Romero will be forced to prove himself. Rickard says that Romero can't get a shot at Dempsey until he has beaten three fighters to be selected from Jack Renault, George Godfrey, Floyd Johnson and Fred Fulton.

But Romero is a better fighter than the four tentatively selected by Rickard to put the test to Romero, but they are better than the third and fourth-raters that were picked out for Firpo.

Firpo worked up to a championship by beating Bill Brennan, Jim Hubbar, Jack McAuliffe, Jack Herman, Jess Willard, Joe Bourke, Homer Smith, Charley Weinert and Joe Downey.

Brennan and Willard were old, worn and through when they fought Firpo, and the others were beaten before they were into the ring.

As the outdoor season approaches there is a great demand for another fight between Dempsey and Firpo. The match is what promoters call a "natural," because it needs no steaming up. Firpo can get the match without doing anything more to prove that he would have a better chance to beat Dempsey the second time than he did on the occasion of their first bout.

Firpo knocked Dempsey to his knees twice and blasted him clear out of the ring once, and that qualified him then and there for another chance at the title. The belief that Dempsey won the fight by the use of foul tactics was enough to guarantee the success of a second meeting without any further exactions from Firpo.

It is quite possible, however, that a return bout between Dempsey and Firpo could be made secondary in interest to a contest between Romero and Dempsey.

If Romero should knock out Renault, Godfrey, Johnson or Fulton, and show the same ferocity of attack, the same style of fighting and the same color that Firpo did against his set-ups, he would become a "natural" for Dempsey.

Reports from qualified French critics who saw Romero fighting in Paris, indicate that he is the same style of fighter as Firpo. He is a right-hand puncher, slow on his feet and ignorant of orthodox boxing form, but wild and almost invincible on the attack.

After he had beaten the giant negro, Gaines, L'Echo Des Sports, the leading short paper of Paris, said: "Romero is a superb athlete, well built and balanced. He is slow in attack, but when he goes after his man nothing can stop him."

L'Auto, another sporting authority, said: "We must look out for this Chilean. He has tremendous strength in his long arm and nothing seems to hurt him."

Gameness, as it is shown in Firpo and as it is said to be evident in Romero, from these reports, is it should be, a characteristic of the South American race, in which here is a strong Italian strain.

When Firpo was advanced into a fight with Dempsey, some of the critics doubted that he could "take it." They thought he had turned timid and pulled up when Jess Willard smacked him on the jaw with a hard left hand and knocked him on the ropes.

But in his fight with Dempsey Firpo showed if he lacked any grit, courage certainly could not be listed among them.

Romero has some Indian blood in him and a strain of Italian. He is said to be tremendously strong and extremely rugged. He is about the same size as Dempsey and weighs 200 pounds, which would indicate that he may take better care of himself and train better than Firpo does.

At various times he has been called Romero-Rojas, but his correct name is Romero, as it was explained by one of his countrymen. Rojas is the name of his mother, and it is customary for some of the Latin races to hyphenate the names of their two parents.

Romero may turn out to be a terrible bust, and, on the other hand, he might be a sensation.

Remembering how the critics made a mistake in their estimation of Firpo, it would be better to withhold judgment on Romero until he has a chance to show himself.

Dempsey-Gibbons Match Not Off

TEX RICKARD TO MAKE DEFINITE OFFER TO KEARNS SHORTLY.

CHICAGO, March 13.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, will defend his title against Luis Firpo in New York Labor Day, he announced here last night. The Argentine will be his only opponent this year, the champion said.

"If Firpo is beaten by Willis or Gibbons, then naturally I would be compelled to fight the winner, the champion asserted. "However, I understand Firpo will not engage in any fight until he meets me. Under such conditions it looks like a quiet outdoor season for me, but my picture work and about six weeks of hard training should leave me fit for the Firpo fight."

Dempsey looked a bit pale and thin after his recent operation at New York.

Dempsey said last night that he was going to his home in Salt Lake City to recuperate from his recent operation.
