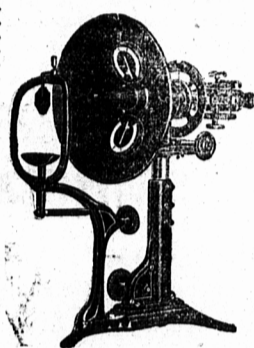

#### MEMBERS AND OFFICES.

The Toronto Globe very properly remarks that "a member of the Legislature with a promise of an appointment in his pocket cannot be independent or really exercise his authority as a representative of the people. The applicant for office, whatever his mandate from the electors, must vote as the Government, not as his conscience or his constituency, may demand."

The object of the Globe in the article from which the above extract is made, is to show that some members of the Ontario Legislature during its recent session were in the position of applicants for or expectants of office, since received, and hence did not vote independently upon the measures which they supported, and which The Globe contends they improperly supported. All of which is quite within the bounds of reasonable credibility.

But the evil complained of is not confined to the Ontario Legislature. It exists from time to time in every Legislature in the land, and in the federal Parliament to an even greater extent. The Globe does not remark upon this, but some years ago, when another Government was in power it was felt to be a very serious matter. Sir William Mulock brought it to notice, and if we remember rightly proposed as a remedy that no member of Parliament should be eligible to appointment to office during two years after leaving his seat in that body.

For obvious reasons Sir William's excellently intended measure did not meet with favor on either side of the house. There were too many applicants and expectants there who were unwilling to close the gates of office against themselves even for so brief a space. And it also happened that Sir William himself, after a most excellent record in Parliament went thence to a high judicial position without any prolonged interim of quarantine.

There are doubtless twice as many cases of applicants and expectants for offices and honors in the Parliament at Ottawa as in the Ontario Legislature or any other like provincial body, and it has been the same under successive Governments. It would be hard to say under which party it has been the worst, but it is not a matter of party at all. So long as the Government of the day has Governorships, Judgeships, Commissionerships, Senatorships and other honorable and well-paid positions to bestow, members of Parliament will seek after them and during the period of expectancy will hold their independence in suspense.

Nor is it easy to indicate a remedy better than that which Sir William Mulock proposed. We have seen that Parliament would not adopt that plan. Nor is it easy to see how the Government can divest itself of the appointing power under our system of Government, as where then would the responsibility for appointment rest. We must fall back upon the honesty and independence of our public men, and strive to elect as far as possible.

"Men whom the lust of office does not kill; Men whom the spoils of office cannot buy."

But where are such men to be found? The average representative elected by the people does not measure up to this standard. And yet in an enlightened Christian country there ought to be many such, if they were sought out, who would measure up even to that higher standard of "the perfect gentleman," whose qualifications were set forth long ago in the Fifteenth Psalm. Is it not part

of the duty of the church to seek out such men to bear rule in the nation? But we shall be told that this is an altogether impracticable idea. For the church as an organized institution has long since relegated the business of choosing our rulers and law makers to the politicians, the conventions and caucuses, while deploring that these latter agencies are corrupt and corrupting and wholly given over to self-seeking human devices. Our Governments and Parliaments are what the people make them; the people have been guided by low standards in making their choice. In fact we have had a double standard for business and politics. Honesty and good faith are exacted in business but not in political life.

#### THE INSANE HOSPITAL.

It is a pleasure to note that the Insane Hospital in Charlottetown is now a well-ordered and well-conducted institution, creditable to the Province and to Superintendent Goodwell. This is the more important from the fact that the insane, like the poor, are always with us and increasing numbers. The numbers cared for in the Hospital are nearly three times as many as there were thirty years ago, but this ratio is no doubt in excess of the growth of insanity, as formerly a much larger number than at present, were cared for in their homes.

Mental derangement in its various forms is as old almost as history, but the first hospitals for the insane of which history or tradition makes mention were the sacred temples in Egypt. The monasteries were utilized for a like charitable object in medieval times. Out of these grew the Bethlehems or Bedlams, the madhouses, which were continued down to the beginning of the nineteenth century. Then the erection of asylums began, which for half a century were little more than jails, grim prison-houses for the seclusion of those unfit or unsafe to be at large, but with little thought or hope of cure.

In the half century past, and notably in the latter half of that period a vast progress has been made in the treatment and cure of insanity. Medical investigation and skill have thrown a flood of light upon the nature and the causes of mental derangement and the result has been a vast improvement in the housing and treatment of the afflicted ones, resulting in a much larger proportion of cures, especially of those brought under care at the beginning of their mental disturbance. The earlier asylums were fearfully insanitary, in most cases over-crowded, and the patients were subject to rigorous and cruel restraints which in many cases aggravated their terrible maladies.

The best modern hospitals for the insane, of which our own is a creditable example, are clean, sanitary, well heated and ventilated, in which
