A GLOOM was cast over the community of Valleyfield, by the announcement of the death of Alexander McLeod Esq., which took place Friday night, Nov. 7. The deceased was in his wonted health up to the previous Monday when he started to visit friends in Park Corner. He remained over night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John A. Gillis, Kinross, where he took suddenly ill. At his urgent request he was removed to his home on Thursday, and Friday night Nov. 7th, he passed away. During his illness he was attended by Dr. Martin, of Grandview, and Dr. McIntyre, of Montague, but the best skill and kindest care proved unavailing. Mr. McLeod was born in the Island of Skye, Scotland in 1827. He emigrated to this country in 1841 and settled in Valleyfield, where his kindness, integrity and public spirit endeared him to the community, which now so deeply regrets his removal. The large attendance at the funeral on Monday witnessed to the esteem in which he was held. The services were conducted by Rev. A. J. McNeill who was assisted by Rev. John Sutherland, Caledonia. There made feeling reference to the estimable qualities of the deceased, and expressed the deep sympathy of the community with his family who have been called upon within the short space of a year to mourn the loss of a father, mother, and brother. Mr. McLeod left a family of six, namely, Mrs. John A. Gillis, Kinross; Mrs. Ramsey, and Mrs. Montgomery, Park Corner; Malcolm MacLeod, on the homestead, Rev. A. D. MacLeod, Zionville, N. B. and Rev. J. M. McLeod, New Mills, N. B.
