Conference Finds Strong Champion

LORD ELIBANK DEFENDS RESULTS AGAINST CRITICISM IN PRESS

OTTAWA, Sept. 11—Criticism of the Imperial Conference from some quarters of the British Press to the effect that the United Kingdom has offered too much to the Dominions, found a defender of the conference's achievements in Lord Elibank, when he was interviewed in the Ritz-Carlton Hotel this morning.

"It is very difficult to size up the amount of trade coming to Great Britain from the other eight component parts of the Empire," he said. "But even if Great Britain had been too generous—in the long run Britain has much to gain for the Dominions and the colonies are still young and growing. Great Britain will benefit from the growth of population and the development of resources."

"As far as Great Britain itself is concerned," Lord Elibank continued, "the population is not likely to expand. Nor is the normal volume of internal trade likely to increase. For these reasons Great Britain is undoubtedly justified in everything she has done at Ottawa, and in time she will receive reward for casting her bread upon the waters."

There are a great many people in Britain who take a narrow view of the Ottawa trade agreements, according to Lord Elibank. So do the Free Trade papers, who naturally are opposed to the achievements of the conference. It is they who find fault with what has been done, and in the opinion of Lord Elibank, they would continue to find fault with anything based on tariff protection.

Lord Elibank himself is a member of the private committee on emigration composed of members of the House of Lords and the House of Commons. This committee, which came into existence little more than a year ago, advised strongly that the question of Empire migration should be one of those discussed at the Imperial Conference.

"But we understood from our own Government as well as from those of the Dominions that it was not an opportune time to talk of migration during this period when the Dominions have so many unemployed," said Lord Elibank. "Besides the agenda of the conference was already very much crowded. And so the question was dropped for the time being."

"I may add, however," he said, "that as a member of this committee I had a number of conversations with your Minister of Immigration and the feeling I found was that members of your Government were very favorably disposed towards the continuance of immigration into Canada as soon as times have improved and the existing unemployment have been absorbed."

The committee of which Lord Elibank is a member has not formulated any specific plans of state-aided emigration from Britain to the Dominions. It is at present merely keeping in touch with the situation, in readiness to act whenever action may be possible.
