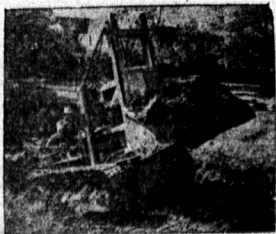

Opera Star To Sing Here



Music lovers of Charlottetown have a rare musical treat in store for them on Thursday evening, March 24th, at 8 o'clock, in P.W.C. Auditorium, when they will have the opportunity of hearing one of Europe's distinguished operatic sopranos, Madame Francesca Radzeviciute, a prima donna of the Lithuanian National Opera, who appears here under the auspices of the United Baptist Church Choir.

Madame Francesca was among Lithuania's displaced persons to arrive in Canada during the past year and since then has been employed as a domestic with Miss Muriel Lutes, Moncton, and has given several recitals in that city. She has spent all the money she's earned since she's been here sending food and clothing to her friends in the D. P. camps.

When singing in Europe, she worked under such distinguished men as Emiel Cooper, now of New York, Conductor Coates of the London Philharmonic and Andre Malko from Prague. She sang as guest soloist in Paris, Prague, Budapest, Berlin, Stuttgart, Latvia and Estonia. "But I was not fond of radio," said Francesca, "because there is no audience. I like singing to actual people best."

We would like to quote in part a letter received here from Mrs. Wm. C. Domplere, Moncton, formerly of this City, regarding Madame Radzeviciute's concert which she was privileged to hear: "It gives me a great deal of personal pleasure to hear that she has been asked to sing in my own beloved Charlottetown. May I say that a rare and wonderful treat is in store for all the City's music lovers. I have been a member of the Community Concerts since they were first organized and heard many fine and well known artists both here and in Opera's abroad, and Madame Francesca rates with the very best. Her own personal charm and unaffected manner will give her audience a great deal of pleasure especially those who may know a little of her life and background with its many personal tragedies. One feels the sadness lying deep in the richness of her voice."

Madame Radzeviciute was the leading student at the Lithuanian Conservatory for seven years, and from there she won a scholarship to the St. Cecilia Conservatory in Rome. She finally made her debut in the Lithuanian National Opera singing the role of Marguerita in "Faust." She has been singing in opera for fifteen years and knows twenty-two operas.

Her program here will be a varied one; ranging from arias to simple folk songs and lullabys, many of which will be sung in English.

Mrs. Elsie Steeves, for many years Organist of the First Baptist Church, Moncton, will be her accompanist and will be heard in several pianoforte numbers.

Couple Face Murder Charge for Abortion

TORONTO, March 11 - A 500-mile police trail ended here early today with the arrest of a man and woman, suspected operators of an Ottawa-Deschenes abortion mill which police say resulted in the death of 25-year-old Jacqueline Lambert.

Police said Roma Bishop Anderson (alias Gibson), 43-year-old Hull, Quec. woman and William Francis Gibson, 46, will be charged with murder. Gibson is described as the woman's common-law husband.
