OF INTEREST TO PORT BOY-
DEN.—While in Ottawa last week, Pre-
sident Asseault had the pleasure of
meeting Professor Adams, recognized
as the world's greatest town plan-
ning expert. He was lent by the
British Government to Canada for
a term of two years. At the request
of the Conservation Commission this
term was extended for two more
years. It will be remembered the
Prof. Adams spent some weeks here
last summer and was delighted with
his vacation. While here he visited
Port Borden and was greatly impres-
sed with its possibilities as a town
of purposes—revisiting Prince Ed-
ward Island next summer for the
purpose of looking further into the
future of Port Borden and assist-
ing in its development. He will pre-
pare plans and maps showing how its
natural advantages may be best uti-
lized to the advantage of its inhabi-
tants. It is hoped the Port Borden
will take advantage of Prof. Adams' goo-
d ideas with a view to not only assis-
ting themselves but to making a
model town. Port Borden is now the gateway of Prince
Edward Island and as first improve-
ments are the most lasting it is of
great importance that visitors on land
in the Garden of the Gulf should
be impressed with the beauty of the
town that is sure to grow up at this
point.
